Now then, if his stickwork is anything like his fielding he ought to be as riotous as big brother Joe.

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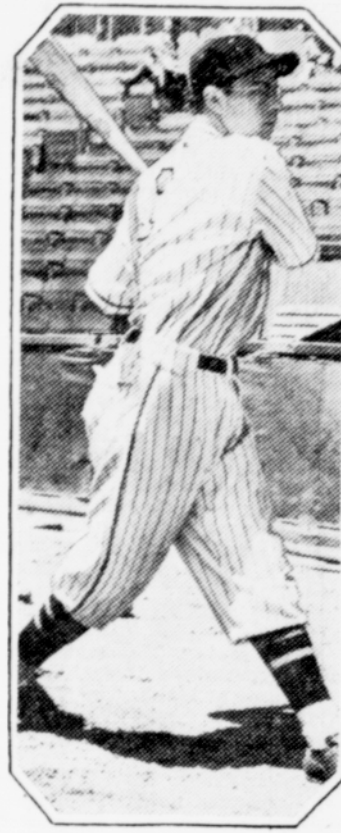
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Dominic DiMaggio. . . . Brother Joe had better watch out.

Farm Accounting System Upheld By OSC Instructor

Two bits invested in the Oregon farm account book is all the equipment anyone needs to prepare himself to keep a systematic record of any farm business, says G. W. Kuhlman, associate professor of farm management at Oregon State college, who has been holding various meetings on the subject throughout the state.

More important than the two bits, however, is the will of the person to keep a faithful record day after day.

"The skeptic is always inclined to wonder whether farmers really keep accounts, and if so, whether they are worthwhile," said Professor Kuhlman recently. "Here is what one Oregon woman reported on this subject, as quoted in a recent national magazine article:

"The farm account records were started in 1936 and they served their purpose well when the income tax collector wanted a share of the profits, which had been spent three years ago. He said the itemized report gave a good picture of the farm operation and he wanted to know if we went to the expense of having a lawyer make it out. I was
