Haller of Pilgrim House announced on Sunday that his resignation had been presented to the Society of Pilgrims, effective on the Sunday before Lent, February 4, ending exactly eleven years of his pastorate in this city. Mr. Haller came here from a two years ministry in Aberdeen, Wash.

Although his resignation will not take effect until February 4, Pastor Haller plans to leave Hillsboro during the previous week in order to attend the sessions of "Ministers' Week" at Chicago Theological Seminary, where the Alden-Tuthill lectures this year will be delivered by Dr. H. E. Luccock, of Yale Divinity school. From Chicago Mr. Haller will go to New York City to engage in social service work similar to that with which he was occupied before coming to the west. He also plans to complete his university work preparatory to a doctor's degree.

During his stay in Hillsboro, Pastor Haller has served as Pastor-Advisor for the young people's Christian Council. During the 11 years of his ministry here he has officiated at 547 funerals and 101 weddings.

Miss Hinman Tells Of Trip to Turkey

Mr. and Mrs. Fred Sewell received a letter last week from Miss Margaret (Dolly) Hinman, who visited here last summer, telling of her return to Izmir, Turkey, where she is engaged in missionary work.

Miss Hinman's letter says, in part: "After visiting my brother and family in San Francisco, I went to New York; thence by American boat to Marseille, N. France, Alexandria, where we spent two days. I went to Cairo to see the Pyramids, the Sphinx, the Nile with its palms and its funny little boats—rode across the desert on such a hot day that we had to go slow for fear the tulle would burn. From Alexandria to Istanbul by Roumanian boat, from Istanbul to Izmir by Turkish boat, and arrived one month from the day I left Portland, August 25. We left Izmir the day before we were to be declared, and everyone, even the bagmen, said I was 'crazy' to come. But you see I got here all right, and here all is so quiet and serene as if no war were going on anywhere in the world. We have more pupils than ever before in our school, 189."

Marseilles was "blacked out" as was our ship both nights we were there. The second night, the city sounded an air-raid alarm, but the enemy planes were chased back before they had done any damage. Now how soldiers feel, I wasn't afraid—just wondered "well what do we do now?" As it turned out we did nothing.

"In Alexandria, the police told me to get out to be searched, but I told them I wouldn't do it, and after some more talk they let me go in peace. Looking for gold, they said on the boat—but, looking for gold on me!"

The Sewells are anxiously looking forward to a letter since the earthquake in Turkey. Miss Hinman, who was formerly of Forest Grove, spoke at the tea given by the Congregational ladies while here last summer.
