

Electrification Meeting in Hillsboro Friday, Saturday to Draw County Farmers

Advantageous Use of Electricity On Farms to Be Demonstrated In Two-day Session Program

Two days of demonstration and discussion of electrical equipment and its operation are scheduled for Washington county Friday and Saturday, January 12 and 13, to be held under direction of F. E. Price, agricultural engineer at Oregon State college, the two-day session will be held in the new Smith-Hughes building at the union high school in Hillsboro with meetings beginning at 9:30 a. m. and lasting throughout the day, according to County Agent W. F. Cyrus. The use of actual equipment will be featured at this meeting.

County Peach Growing Topic

Peach production problems in Washington county will be given attention by local growers at a meeting in the county courtroom, Thursday, January 12, beginning at 10 a. m., and continuing into the afternoon, according to W. F. Cyrus, county agent. The meeting will feature illustrated discussions of sprays and methods of spraying; local grower discussions of their problems in growing peaches; the behavior of new peach varieties; grafting over old trees into new varieties and maintaining fertility in the peach orchard.

In addition to the local growers and County Agent Cyrus, O. T. McWhorter, extension horticulturist; W. P. Daruz, of the horticultural staff at the experiment station; and probably C. E. Owens, plant pathologist, will participate in this meeting.
