

Home Agent, School Head Speak at P.T.A. Meet

Hillsboro Parent-Teacher association members heard Miss Kathleen McCrea, newly-appointed county home demonstration agent, and J. W. Poynter, city superintendent of schools, in a pair of interesting talks at Monday evening's meeting.

Miss McCrea, formerly home economics demonstration agent for the state at large in the O. S. C. extension service, presented an outline of her duties in the county. Work of a home demonstration agent is chiefly in the home, she said, and through that work much benefit can be derived by students and younger people if proper cooperation is available.

Speaking on "Hidden Influences," which he described as those factors and examples which unconsciously have tremendous bearing on the formation of youthful character, Superintendent Poynter stressed importance of home life in character development. Often we have instances of parents talking and teaching honestly, and then going against the teaching by the example they set, he said.

Other similar instances were recounted by Poynter in showing that education goes on every moment the child is awake. "These influences are hidden, in a sense," he stated, "but their consequences are often very apparent."
