Long, who is himself distantly related and distinguished as a veteran newspaperman in Washington county.

Roth's great-grandfather, S. A. Deane, was a "Connecticut Yankee" whose exploits in the Revolutionary war are a matter of history. Roth stated, Deane was hired as the revolutionary government's first special agent and it was through his efforts, aided by Lafayette, that military reinforcements were sent to the colonies from France, Roth related.

Circuit Judge Donald E. Long, of Portland, son of L. A. Long, is a cousin of Roth, as is Burlington Grimes, major league baseball star. A great-grandfather of Roth's fought in the battle of Shiloh in the Civil war with the 13th volunteer regiment from Wisconsin, Long stated. Roth is the son of Mrs. Frances Roth of near Washington, Wash.

BEAVERTON—The Beaverton city council has announced the acceptance of a bid from the Baker-Fordyce-Tucker company of Portland for the purchase of Town of Beaverton Water Refunding bonds, series of 1940. The bonds to be refunded have been interest at the rate of five per cent per annum and the new issue will bear not to exceed 2 1/2 per cent on \$30,000 and 2 1/4 per cent on \$15,000. The results will be a material decrease in civic expense. Bids were received from three firms.
