

Mrs. J. Jones, Early Resident Of County, Dies

CHEHALEM MOUNTAIN—Mrs. J. P. Jones died January 13 at a Tillamook hospital. She had been ill for several months at the home of a daughter, Mrs. Lee Lane, near Garibaldi. Mrs. Jones was born near Newberg April 13, 1869, on the donation land claim of her grandfather, David and Susan Shuck Ramsey. Her parents were James and Sarah Bryan.

Miss Lydia Bryan and John Paul Jones were married June 16, 1888 at Forest Grove. They celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary with a picnic dinner and program at the Pleasant View school house June 19, 1939.

Mr. and Mrs. Jones bought property in the Pleasant View district in 1890 and had owned it here ever since, although they had resided elsewhere for short periods.

Mrs. Jones is survived by the widow, one son, J. Wayne Jones of Chehalis Mountain; two daughters, Mrs. Lois Lane of Garibaldi, Mrs. Mae Ego of Mountain Home; 15 grandchildren, and one great-granddaughter. One daughter, Mrs. Alma Schmeltzer, died in 1922. Mr. and Mrs. Jones raised her baby son, Leland Schmeltzer, who made his home with them until he left for California this winter. Two brothers and four sisters also survive—Plaz and Hugh Bryan, Mrs. Mary Duncan and Mrs. Lizzie Brooks of Carlton, Mrs. Dot Morrison of Sterling, Idaho, and Mrs. Minnie Chamberlin of Portland.

Funeral services were held Monday at the C. A. Hodson mortuary in Newberg. Pallbearers were Homer and William Rogers, Ira G. McCormick, L. T. Finigan, W. I. Jones and Tow Herd, all of pioneer families. Interment was in the Friends cemetery at Newberg. Stanley Kendall officiated and Homer Hester sang.

Mrs. A. Perkins, Long Resident Of City, Passes

Mrs. Amanda Jane Perkins, 82 Hillsboro resident since the 1890's, died at her home on South Third avenue Friday. She was the eldest member of the Christian church here and her home when originally built, was reputedly the first Christian church established this side of the Rocky Mountains.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Monday in the First Christian church here with interment in the Masonic cemetery. Arrangements were in charge of the Forest Grove Undertaking company.

Surviving are one daughter, Mrs. M. L. Berdan of Forest Grove, and four sons, Leo Perkins of Portland, one-time county recorder in Hillsboro; Dr. T. L. Perkins, San Fernando, Cal.; former Portland city commissioner, J. B. Perkins; a member of the Portland police force, and B. R. Perkins of Kent, Wash.

There are also surviving Mrs. C. M. Bryant of Hillsboro, a half sister, two half brothers, 11 grandchildren and 18 great-grandchildren. Her husband, the late Thomas B. Perkins, was one of Meier & Frank's early employees and at one time a merchandise store operator in Hillsboro.

She was born in Wayne county, Kentucky, on January 16, 1857, and came overland to San Francisco in 1888, later coming to Oregon and Washington county by boat. On April 9, 1939, Mrs. Perkins was one of a family reunion group assembled at her home which represented four generations on both sides of the family joined by an infant great-grandson.
