Fruit Growers' Meetings Set for Banks, Sherwood

Strawberry and small fruit growers will meet at Banks and Sherwood January 31 and February 1, according to present indications. Says County Agent W. F. Cyrus, at Banks on Wednesday, January 23, strawberry growers will discuss problems of their industry. At Sherwood on Thursday, February 1, discussions will center around strawberries and black raspberries. Both meetings will begin at 10 a. m.

At both of these meetings summaries of data on new varieties will be presented; progress in the development of improved planting stock will be outlined together with results being obtained from this planting stock; insect pest control, soil management to maintain fertility and fertilizer practices will be outlined; topics that will be developed by local growers and Oregon State college extension service help. W. D. Edwards, entomologist; O. T. McWhorter, extension horticulturist; and Dr. George Waldo, of the United States department of agriculture will participate in these programs.
