Many Fields of Public Service Kept County Health Office Busy During Year, Survey Shows

The Washington county health office, under supervision of Dr. R. N. Sherwin, had plenty of patients and a profusion of other activities to keep the staff busy during 1939, according to a survey report of the year released this week.

Public health work was carried on in 12 different fields,

listed as follows: communicable disease control, venereal disease control, tuberculosis control, maternity service, infant and pre-school hygiene, school hygiene, adult hygiene, morbidity service, crippled children, general sanitation, laboratory examinations and diseases reported.

Diseases Checked
Visits numbering over 900 were made in behalf of control of communicable diseases such as scarlet fever, smallpox, diphtheria and others. Active cases were isolated by quarantine. Over 1500 patients received preventative inoculations against smallpox, diphtheria and whooping cough with special stress in this program being aid on children of school and pre-school age.

During the year period, 421 treatment visits for control of syphilis and gonorrhea were made for persons unable to provide their own medical care under a private physician. Under this program, the law requiring testing of all county jail prisoners for venereal diseases has been complied with and out of 87 prisoners tested, three syphilis cases were found.

The tuberculin testing program was continued during 1939 with 1961 tests being given. Of this total, 156 cases were positive, indicating that about seven per cent of the population is suffering, actively or otherwise from tuberculosis. Eight open cases were admitted for sanatorium care.

Numbers Listed
Specific cases and numbers of patients served through the department's other activities were listed as follows: maternity service—clinic visits, 239; nursing visits, 86; infant and pre-school hygiene—infant visits to clinic, 290; pre-school visits to clinic, 86; nursing visits to clinic, 205; school hygiene—inspections by physicians, 341; field visits, 716; lectures, 29; attendance, 2655; morbidity service—clinic visits, 2238; field nursing visits, 89; field medical visits, 201; admissions to hospitals, 418; total patient days of hospital service, 10,626; tonsils and adenoid operations, 40.

Crippled children—admissions, 28; clinic visits, 46; nursing, 91; general sanitation—private premises, 4; camp sites, 65; schools, 149; public water supplies, 1; sewage plants, 1; berry fields, 15; laboratory examinations—water, 132; typhoid, 5; diphtheria, 14; syphilis, 363; gonorrhea, 29; tuberculosis, 37; urinalysis, 280; spinal fluids, 13.

Diseases reported at the health office were listed as follows: Chick-pox, 93; diphtheria, 1; Influenza, 24; Measles, 66; Pneumonia, 39; Poliomyelitis, 1; Scarlet fever, 78; Staphylococci sore throat, 1; Syphilis, 4; Tuberculosis, 5; Typhoid fever, 2; Undulant fever, 1; Whooping cough, 27; Mumps, 88; Erysipelas, 4; Trench mouth, 2.

In addition to Dr. Sherwin, three health nurses are on the health office staff. They are Corinne Peterson, Edna Mae Wells and Virginia Peterson.

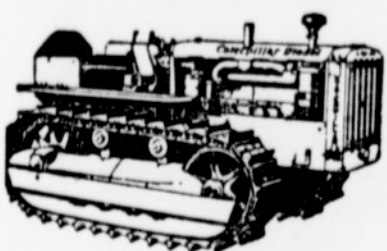
Schefflin League Hosts to Grove
