Organization of Church Planned Sunday Dixie Mt.

Dixie Mountain district has boasted a chapel for 39 years. For it was in 1901 that the present chapel was built on ground given to the White Temple church of Portland by Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Nelson, who were among the early settlers of the district. But since the World War there had been anything like a regular church service in the church. Sunday schools were organized from time to time and would flourish, and then fade away.

But 18 months ago, a group of people met again to organize a Sunday school, since that time the Sunday school has not failed to meet, and new members are constantly being added to the rolls. A preaching service was also arranged for at the time of the organization of the Sunday school, and regular preaching services have been held each Sunday. Four months ago it was decided to start a mid-week prayer service, where we could meet together to study God's word and fellowship together in prayer, but this service has not yet started, many young people as well as adults attending.

Johnson, pastor of Hinson Memorial church, Portland, has been invited as guest speaker. The service will be special music. All interested are invited.

Rev. Albert Fuller, says, "We expect about twenty-five to unite with us the day of organization but for 90 days so that others may also join with us as charter members of this church. Provision is made to take in those of any Evangelical denomination, as associate members if they desire."

Program for organization Sunday is as follows: Sunday school, 10 a. m.; church service, 11 a. m.; pot-luck lunch, 12:15; organization meeting, 2:30 p. m.; evening church service at 8 (at Hillsboro Baptist church); baptismal service, 9 p. m. (at Hillsboro Baptist church).

Thanks is extended to the Hillsboro Baptist church, its officers and members for their co-operation and help, as the Dixie Mountain chapel does not have provisions for administering the ordinance of baptism.
