Price Factor Considered for Fruit Growers

The long-time outlook for small fruit production, one of Oregon's most important specialty crop industries, is geared rather closely to trends and levels of consumer purchasing power and total supplies in the whole country, according to an analysis just made and reported by the Oregon State college extension service. The purpose of the report is to assist small fruit producers in planning their production and marketing operations over a period of years.

A remarkable relationship appears to exist between price levels for small fruits in Oregon and the two factors, income of consumers and total production of fruit. Consequently, the outlook for small fruits will be affected by future trends in these factors as well as by production and marketing operations within the small fruit industry itself.

Tables Given

The report contains several statistical tables and graphs giving information on small fruit acreage, production, utilization, prices and income. The importance of the industry in Oregon is shown in that at least 25,000 acres are devoted to the production of strawberries, raspberries, loganberries, blackcap raspberries, youngberries, boysenberries, blackberries, gooseberries, cranberries, and other small fruits including grapes, currants, and even blueberries and huckleberries.

This acreage brought an annual cash farm income of \$3,500,000 as the 1936-1938 average, with prices about three-fourths as high as during the 1926-1930 period. In addition to the farm income much value was added by manufacture of the products. The industry provides employment for large numbers of workers in harvesting and processing operations.

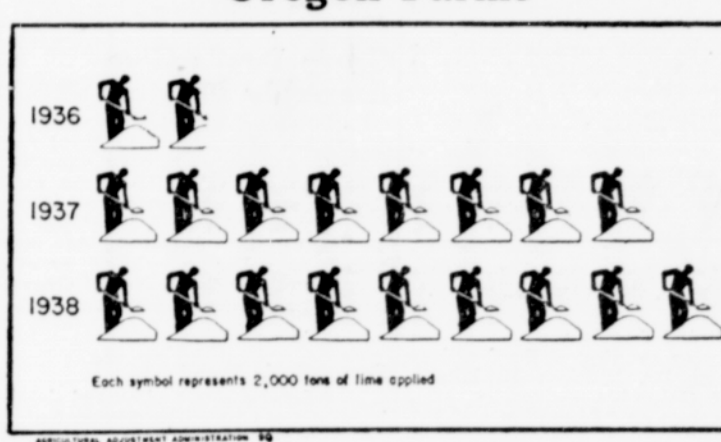

Sales Activity In Jersey Market Reported Here

Exceptional sales activity has marked the Jersey dairy cattle market in Washington county during the past two weeks, according to word from W. Putnam and Sons of Farmington, who report sales of 11 blooded animals within a ten-day period.

Three milking cows from this farm were sold to a Vancouver, Wash., dairy farm and two heifers have been sold to Dr. Stanley Lamb of Portland, who has sent the animals to his farm in the Nehalem valley. They have been bred to a blueblood bull of Putnam's recently imported from Ontario.

Five more heifers have been sold and sent to Olympia, Wash., and another animal has been sold to a Tillamook county farmer. Putnam's new bull, while too young to yet have any daughters milking, bids fair to make a mark in Washington.

Nursery Industry Large in State

The group of crops classified as nursery, greenhouse and ornamental crops is nearly a three million dollar industry in Oregon, based on cash farm income alone, according to statistics prepared by the Oregon State college extension service. The ornamentals include flower bulbs and seeds, cut flowers and holly. Nursery crops include young fruit and nut trees, berry plants and cuttings, rose stock, and a multitude of ornamental plants, bushes and trees. Approximately 80 acres of land are under glass in this state for the production of greenhouse flowers and vegetable crops.
