The reason for this is that Karl Kuban, a pupil of the third grade, and Hans Grass, a pupil of the first grade, who are Austrian children and who have come to America and settled with their parents in the Cipole community. They left Austria a short while after the Nazi invasion. Another interesting feature of their immigration is that two more families came with them and all four families are living in the same house and all help operate the same farm and dairy. Hans Grass has returned to school after an absence of two months due to illness.

Mental Sickness Loss Pointed Out

Economic cost due to mental sickness throughout the United States was discussed at the Rotary club luncheon Thursday by Robert Lang, executive secretary of the Oregon Mental Hygiene society. J. M. Peterson was chairman.

Over half of the 1,000,000 hospital beds in the United States are occupied by mental cases, declared Lang, who pointed out that the yearly job loss due to such cases was \$700,000,000.

Washington county in the last biennium committed 85 people to the two state hospitals or an average of 2.7 per cent per 1000 population in contrast with 3 per cent for the state, the speaker said.

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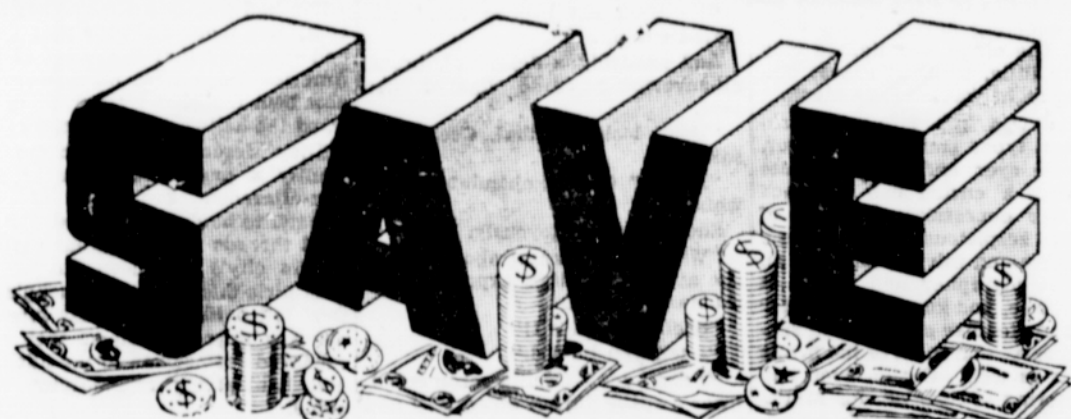
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
