C. E. Barker received a letter postmarked, "Lincoln's New Salem, Feb. 12, 1940, P. M." It was the first batch of mail sent out from this new postoffice. On the face of the envelope is a picture, 2x3 inches, of the reconstructed log store where Abraham Lincoln as postmaster handed out mail to New Salem's 100 inhabitants from May 7, 1833, to May 30, 1838.

On the reverse side is a facsimile of Governor Horner's handwriting. "Courtesy of Henry Horner, Governor." Within the envelope was a program of the dedication exercises, the dedication address by Postmaster General James A. Farley, and a brief survey of "Lincoln as Postmaster," by Paul M. Angle, secretary, Illinois State Historical society. There is no other postoffice like this in the world.

The dedication was broadcast over two national radio hook-ups. The first mail coming into the new postoffice on February 12 was brought from Springfield by a pioneer stage coach and was eight hours covering the distance of 26 miles. After this sack was distributed a mail plane landed with another sack of letters, making the same trip in ten minutes.
