

Dairy Group Re-elects All 1939 Officers

All officers of the Washington County Dairy Herd Improvement Association were re-elected at the group's annual all-day meeting in the chamber of commerce rooms here last Tuesday.

Officers are as follows: Henry Hagg, Reedville, president; J. R. Pabel, Hillsboro route 4, vice-president; C. B. Buchanan Jr., Gaston, treasurer; Edward W. Freudenthal, Hillsboro route 5, and Warren Corey, Cornelius route 11, directors. Hal VanHouten and John Astelford are testers in this county.

More than 80 county dairymen attended the meeting, which was highlighted by informing talks of Roger Morse, dairy extension specialist, and A. G. Brown, manager of the Interstate Creamery association. Morse explained the feed requirements for various types of dairy cattle, illustrating his points with numerous charts showing the alfalfa equivalents of cow feeds.

Present trends do not indicate that there will be any upward movement in dairy prices in the near future, the association was told by Brown, who called attention to the fact that war conditions always lower the demand for butter and fat products. The increased industrial activity in this country because of the war is liable to improve our employment situation, however, so that the slack may be taken up with home consumption, he said.

Henry Hagg, who presided over the meeting, reminded the association members of the great strides which have been made in herd improvement work by citing the growth of testing since 1930. During the years from 1930 to 1933, Hagg said, only about five herds in the county were keeping test records. In 1939, 62 herds in the county were being tested and at the present time there are 11 herds on the waiting list, necessitating the addition of another part-time tester in the near future.

Former Local Man Dies at Oregon City

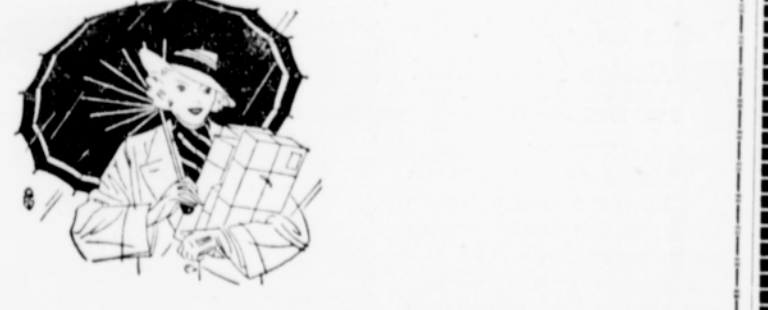
William M. Robinson, 81, who operated a livery barn here for several years near the present post office, died at Oregon City Monday.

This past summer 1500 delegates from 70 countries, gathered at Amsterdam, Holland, for the World's Conference of Christian Youth.
