(Continued from page 1) Inhalator machine which can deliver ether, nitrous oxide (laughing gas), carbon dioxide (for respiration), oxygen or cyclopropane gas.

The delivery room is adequately equipped with a breakable obstetric bed and other pieces. A separate washroom adjoins for obstetric doctors and nurses. The entire surgery department is supplied with heat from its own furnace unit so that the temperature may be raised and lowered to any desired mark without effecting the normal temperature of the rest of the hospital. In addition to Mrs. Coy, superintendent, the hospital staff includes seven regularly employed assistants and six special nurses. They are Dorothy Spitzer, head nurse, and Mary Seis, Lorna Mullanix, Kate Teufel, Magdalena Bockel, Edith Moore and Lorraine Nelson, all on the full-time staff, and Mrs. Bessie Thompson, Mrs. Goldie Worthing, Mrs. Nellie Fayram, Mrs. Esther Auld, Kay Durie and Mrs. Lois Hines, part-time attendants.

Others on the regular staff are Mrs. Annie Kearn, laundress, Neva Gillenwater, cook, and Maude McCullough, housekeeper.
