Bones from the skeleton of a buffalo found in 1933 in the dried up Malheur Lake bed were brought in for display this week by Mrs. Dorcas N. Neal of Aloha. Mrs. Neal's late husband, J. H. Neal, made the first survey of Malheur lake in 1887 and later conducted the "Meander line" survey which still stands. It has been some two decades ago since Mr. Neal was first summoned as a witness for the settlers in their struggle for title to land within the meander line survey. Finding of buffalo bones in the dry lake bed verified an old Indian legend concerning herds of buffalo which long ago roamed the Harney valley, Mrs. Neal said.
