

Development in 50 Years Noted Home Economics

The fiftieth anniversary celebration of the founding of the school of home economics at Oregon State college has just been completed. Looking back over a period of fifty years, time observes many interesting facts. The course of study has been subjected to frequent changes, as science has contributed to our knowledge of what makes the successful home, as industry has altered our ways of living, and as Oregon has become increasingly urbanized. Its development has been marked by the constantly increasing standards of the home economics profession and by the growing public appreciation of the value of training for homemaking.

A staff of 48 women (full-time equivalent) now has charge of the home economics work at Oregon state college. Enrollment at present totals 600 majors and about 200 men and women each quarter who are non-majors. For the fiftieth year, the Home Economics club is supporting a scholarship granted to a foreign student.

Work Widespread
Organized home demonstration work is being carried on in 12 counties, and girls' 4-H club work is carried on in all counties of the state.

The physical plant utilized for resident work includes most of the Home Economics building, three home management houses and the nursery school. Practice and apprentice teaching are done in the schools of Corvallis and in six other towns; practice in institutional management is given in the Memorial Union dining service and men's and women's dormitories.

The home economics curricula at Oregon State college today includes the following fields: Clothing, textiles, and related arts, foods and nutrition, household administration, home economics education and institution economics.

Three major pieces of research are under way. They include the study of housing arrangements for family needs that was started in 1931, the study of nutritional values in frozen vegetables that was initiated in 1936, and the study of the contribution of Oregon diets to vitamin C requirements, begun in 1937.

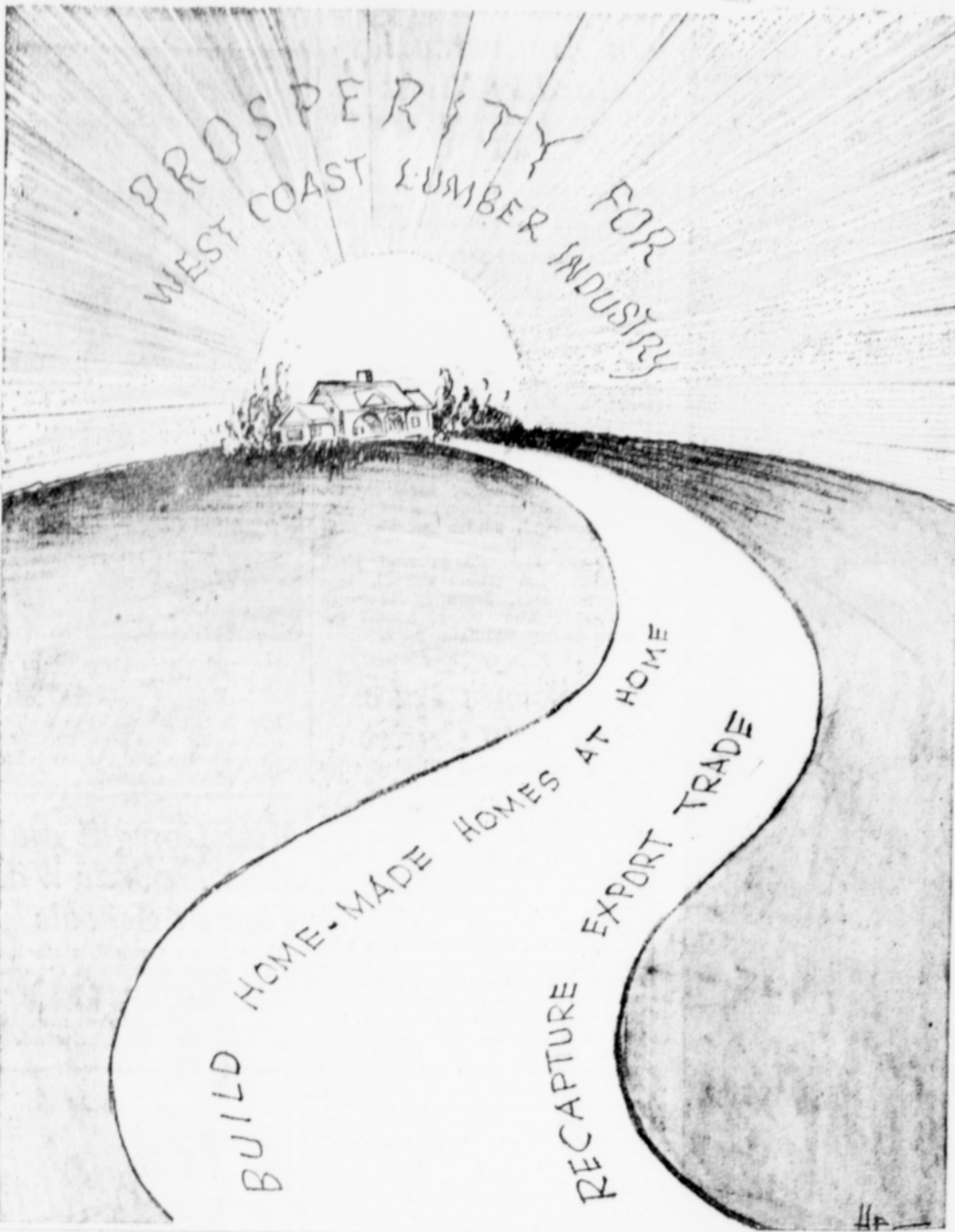
Material Available
By means of extension work, home economics information is carried to the homes of the state where 10,000 homemakers are enrolled in supervised projects. The list of published material now available for distribution to Oregon homemakers includes 626 bulletins written by home economics extension specialists. The program of work of the extension service is based on the needs and desires of the people. Many projects are based on a long-time period and are carried on with all members of the family.

Future Scanned
It is safe to predict that the school of home economics will continue to devote itself to the interests of Oregon's citizens, to widen its field of service, and to keep abreast of changing social and economic conditions and educational concepts. Its graduates will continue to demonstrate the value of their home economics training by spending their family incomes wisely, by training their children to be useful members of society, and by maintaining physical and mental health through sane living.

TOURIST COTTAGES AND CAMPS

By State Board of Health

It is time again for all operators of tourist cottages, camps, picnic parks, and similar places of business to make application to the state board of health for the inspection of their business enterprises. The fees for this inspection service are nominal, the minimum being three dollars per year.

The state board of health employs a full-time tourist camp inspector who investigates all such establishments catering to tourists. The inspection by the board of health includes a check-up of water supply, toilet facilities and sewage disposal, garbage collection and disposal, the construction and maintenance of cottages, cabins, and, in fact, all features of tourist camps which may affect the health and comfort of those who use the facilities. The co-operation of the operators of these places of business as well as the public, is solicited in order that clean, attractive places may be available for the tourists who visit Oregon. The tourist business constitutes one of the state's principal industries.
