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Mrs. J. M. Person Returns from Trip to Honolulu

"To go from a cold, rainy, mid-winter to a land of flowers, sunshine and ideal bathing beaches is about as pleasant an experience as anyone could have," said Mrs. J. M. Person of her trip to Honolulu from which she returned February 28 after a month's visit with her son Bud.

Mrs. Person was impressed with the beauty of Honolulu, the flowers, hospitality, activity, the modern buildings, and the art of living found there. Streets and highways are lined with blooming trees, walls are covered with flowering vines—not one month but every month in the year. The people are most hospitable, the newcomers or malihini, the Hawaiians call them, soon find new buildings and apartment houses are of the most modern type. Lots of new apartments are being built to care for the heavy tourist trade.

Because of the army and navy bases and the city of Honolulu the island of Oahu has the most activity of the group of eight Hawaiian Islands. Even with this activity she says of the people, "They take life easier than we do, maybe because of the climate and maybe because they are smart. No one rushes as we do here. Stores and offices close anywhere from 3 to 5 in the afternoon, and most of them close at noon on Saturday. Everyone seems to know how to relax and enjoy themselves."

In the Window

"President McKinley is Dead" So reads the banner-line in an Oregonian dated September 14, 1901, and resurrected from an old trunk this week by Harry Seabold of Hillsboro. In excellent state of preservation despite its discoloration, the paper used two of its front page columns for advertising and devoted the entire remainder of the first page—plus all of pages two and three and most of page four—to various news slants on the assassinated president.

They are, in common terminology, agate-filled nodules which have been cut and highly polished. The Rice collection also includes a piece of colorful petrified wood.
