Plat Filing Adds To Boom Community

Steamed Veal Loaf

(To be eaten cold)
Four pounds of lean veal and 1 cup salt pork chopped fine or grind it. 1 cup of freshly grated bread crumbs, 2 eggs well beaten, 3 level teaspoons salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, a tablespoon each of celery and parsley, cut fine, 1/2 tablespoon of onion.

Put ingredients into an earthen bowl and mix well with the hands. Butter baking powder cans or a mold. Coat with bread crumbs. Fill compactly with the meat and cover with light-fitting lid. Place can in cooker. Let pound cans steam about 1 1/2 hours. Do not remove from cans until cold. This is a nice luncheon meat at home and especially nice for picnic purposes.—Mrs. A. S. Hendricks.

Billy Boy Peanut Cookies
One-fourth cup butter, 1 egg, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup sugar, 2 tablespoons milk, 2 level teaspoons baking powder, 1 cup peanuts.

Cream butter, beat in sugar, egg, milk and flour sifted with baking powder. Reserve 2 dozen whole nuts and chop the rest fine. Add chopped nuts to the mixture. Drop on a buttered tin a teaspoon in a place, place a whole nut on top. Bake in a moderate oven.—Mrs. A. S. Hendricks.

Rice and Salmon Loaf
Two cups hot boiled rice, 1 can salmon, 2 eggs beaten, 2 tablespoons butter, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, juice of 1/2 lemon, 1 tablespoon onion.

Mix ingredients together, add juice from salmon. Put in greased baking dish in a moderate oven. Garnish with parsley and sliced lemons. Serve with tomato sauce.—Mrs. A. S. Hendricks.

Baked Beans
Soak overnight 3 cups small white beans. Drain off water in morning and put beans in kettle on top of stove. Cut up about 3 slices fat bacon or salt pork in small pieces. (If pork isn't very fat put in 1 tablespoon grease), salt to taste. Add 1 can hot sauce or similar amount of chili sauce; add 1/2 cup brown sugar, 1 tablespoon chopped onion (more if desired), clove of garlic, 2 teaspoons dry mustard, pinch of black pepper, dash or two of red pepper, pinch of cloves. Cover with water and stew for few minutes until all is blended together, then put in bean pot and cook until tender, adding a little hot water if the beans cook dry.—Mrs. Sidney Connolly, Willamina.
