Ralph Gamble, 33, arrested in Forest Grove, was booked at the county jail Tuesday on a check charge in Wasco county. Arrangements were made for his release.

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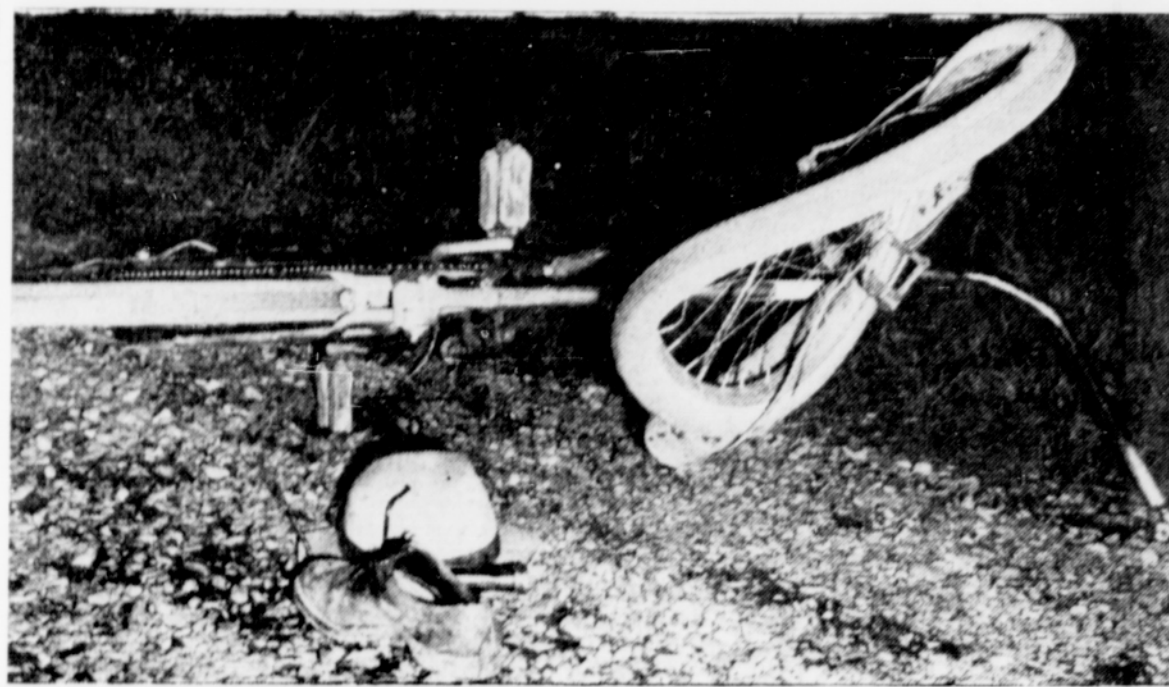
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Twisted Bicycle Evidence of Highway Fatality

Weevil Control Dust Machine To Be Displayed

New type equipment for applying rotenone dust in the control of weevils will be shown at two places in Washington county next week, says County Agent W. F. Cyrus. This equipment developed by K. W. Gray, entomologist at the Oregon experiment station, will be in front of the Sherwood city hall at 9:45 a. m. Wednesday, March 13. At 1:30 p. m. Thursday, March 14, the outfit will be in the lot near the Imperial Feed and Grain company in Hillsboro.

This is the pusher type of duster developed especially for fighting aphids on the cannerly pea crop in eastern Oregon. While entomologists are not recommending at this time that the Austrian peas be dusted for aphid control this type of dusting equipment is as effective for applying dust to control weevils.

There probably will be a need for additional dusting equipment in Washington county for the 1940 season. Local growers who are contemplating building dusting equipment will probably be interested in looking this outfit over.

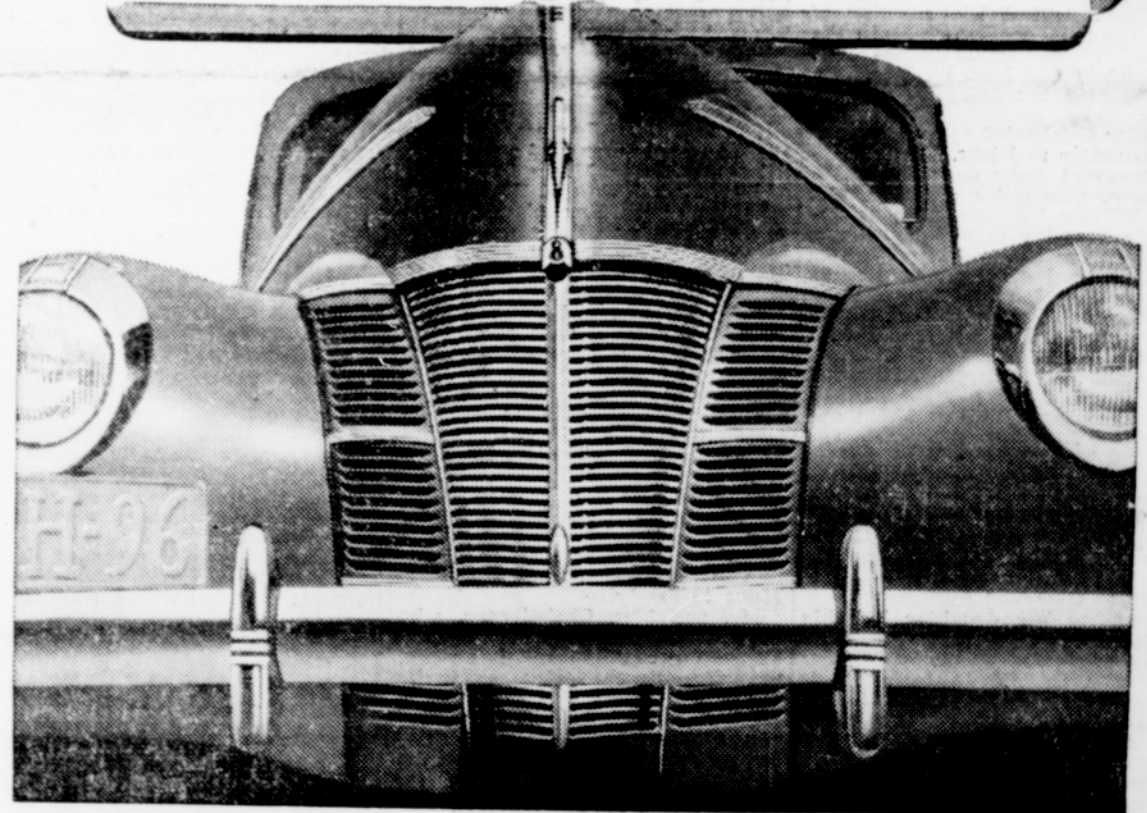
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
