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Current Fiction Added to Hillsboro Library Shelves

"Right off the press" is the expression used by Hillsboro's public librarian, Miss Georgia Smith, to describe the freshness of late fiction books recently added to the library shelves.

Among these volumes which have received the most widespread favorable comments for critics are the following: "The Good Companions," by Robert A. Bly, a beautiful story of love and faith.

"Love in the Sun" by Leo Walmsley—A true story of a man and a girl who possessed nothing in life but love, courage, and faith in the future. A delightful novel.

"Eagles Gather" by Taylor Caldwell, author of "Dynasty of Death."

"A dramatic, eventful novel of a great military clan."

"Sun of the Storm" by Unto Seppanen—A story of Finland's struggle for freedom from Russia as portrayed by Marku and his family during the last century. Beauty and violence are combined in this strong earthy book.

"Free and Clear" by McIntire—A wholesome story of family life on "Main Farm."

"Other Gods—An American Legend" by Pearl S. Buck—A novel set in Orient and America. It is a story of a woman's difficult adjustment as the wife of a popular idol. Will provoke discussion on hero worship.

"Loon Feather" by Lola Fuller—A story of fur-trading days on Mackinac Island centering around the daughter of great chieftain. A rich dramatic story.

"Mrs. Morton of Mexico" by Arthur Ficke—A humorous story of an old English woman who lived in her comfortable home on the shore of Lake Chapala, in Mexico.
