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Second Rate Cut Effective In Electricity

Home users of electricity Friday again realized benefit from local distribution of Bonneville power over lines of the Portland General Electric company, when the second residential rate reduction made by the company since January 1 went into effect.

Users are being billed under the new rate with all meter readings taken on and after March 16. The rate is effective uniformly throughout P. G. E. territory and, together with the January 1 reduction, will represent savings to P. G. E. customers of approximately \$660,000 a year.

Savings Shown
For consumptions up to 200 kilowatt hours per month, which take in the large bulk of residential customers, typical monthly bills and savings over the rate in effect prior to January 1 are as follows:

P. G. E. also is to file new commercial rate schedules which will go into effect on March 25. New commercial rates will be greatly simplified and will represent substantial reductions over rates now in effect, company officials declared.

"Residents of both Seattle and Los Angeles, which have municipally-owned electric systems, now pay a higher residential rate in virtually all use blocks than do P. G. E. customers under the company's newest residential rate," declared R. R. Easter, division manager. "The new rate also is lower than those of any distributing utility in the entire United States, and is preferred uniformly over an area comparable in size in population to that served by P. G. E."
