## 35 Lettermen Return for Meet Events

Thirty-five Hillsboro high school tracksters and would-be cindermen answered Coach Alvin Boque's first tryout call Monday and managed to shake off a little winter inactivity as they jaunted around the Hilli track.

Seven track lettermen were among the starting crew. They are Bill Fockler and Gene Newberry, going out for dashes; Sterling Naught, discuss and shot-put; Ed Wells, javelin; Preston Drake and Sid Seymour, distance runs, and Dick Martin, pole vault.

Timing of initial tryouts was a demonstration of rusty joints, according to Coach Boque, but a number of promising recruits were already cutting down the speed of the top-watch second hand as ensuing field seasons loosened them up on Tuesday and Wednesday.

On the east end of the Hilli field, meanwhile, Coach Hughes has had his baseball gang going through their trances. Five practice games have been played. Selection of a squad of 20 men from the 45 who turned out will be made Friday, Hughes announced this week.

## Clean Sweeps Topple Pin Leaderships

Leadership in the National and Washington County kegling loops were "gone with the wind" of hurricane bowling this week as second place teams smashed pin triangles for clean-sweep victories.

P. G. E. took the limelight in the National circuit by blanking last week's top place Loomis Fuel team, 749-711, 774-596 and 787-731, to take a two-game lead over the former bracket claimants. A like demonstration of kegling skill by Cate Blanking, the top place County league, booted the Al's Oasis crew down to second place and hoisted the three-top squad from Forest Grove to the top. Scores were 727-693, 831-668 and 708-600.

## Initial Plans For Softball Opening Laid

Initial plans for a gala opening of Hillsboro's softball season on or near May 1 were discussed at a meeting this week of organization leaders and a possibility was seen that another meeting of team sponsors might be called for Friday night, according to Frank Doane, Hillsboro coach.

The softball board elected Doane chairman, Ray Dillon as director and Pete Schukart as commissioner, and groundskeeper. In addition, C. J. Starr was named secretary and Jack Seary, treasurer, of the organization. Duties in connection with softball league management will be divided among the five men, Doane said.

Cliff Knickerbocker of McMinnville, president of the state softball association, will be here for the season opening program and an invitation to participate in the program is being sent to Dwight Adams, state secretary.

Fourteen team captains and sponsors are also to be presented with the loop this year and it is hoped that another four teams will be sponsored to form an even 20-member league. Season tickets, soon to go on sale at one dollar each, are to be presented to school board members and to cash sponsors of the project which gave the high school field lights. Hillsboro's mayor or is also to be presented with an complimentary pass, Doane said.

From previous experience with games on the Hilli field, it is known approximately what costs may be expected for a season's play under the lights, Doane said this week, and a budget has been drawn up to conform with contemplated expenses.

## Track Meet Slate Drafted; Baseball Sked Rejected

A track and field meet schedule embracing the T. Y. V. league and other schools in Yamhill and Columbia counties was drafted Tuesday night by coaches and athletic officials at a meeting in Forest Grove.

A baseball schedule was drawn up for teams entered in T. Y. V. league competition—Hillsboro, Forest Grove, Sherwood, Tigard and Newberg—but inasmuch as the slate called for only four games per team, it was not deemed acceptable and further planning to work out a schedule with more games is in the offing, according to Paul Hughes, Hillsboro coach.

A committee to discuss the feasibility of holding a county opener in football to launch the coming pigskin season was appointed. The committee will report its recommendations at a meeting to be called later.
