### City is Defendant In Damage Suit

Seeking \$1500 damages for injuries allegedly suffered at the Hillsboro baseball park during the Junior Legion tournament last year, a suit was filed in circuit court here Monday by Virginia Mae Stanley, 16, through her guardian ad litem, J. E. Stanley, against the city of Hillsboro.

On or about August 6, 1939, the complaint charges, the girl suffered a severe injury when she slipped in the park grandstand and thrust a six-inch splinter into her knee and leg. In addition to the general damage sum, \$164.25 special damages are sought.

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### Property Taxes Represent 13% Of Firm Revenue

Portland General Electric company, Oregon's largest single taxpayer, this week presented a check for \$44,805.39 to County Sheriff J. W. Connell, in payment of the company's Washington county taxes for 1939.

Total 1939 property taxes of the company payable to all of the eight counties in which it operates (exclusive of certain non-utility property taxes estimated in the amount of \$5,560) are \$1,316,372.74 or in excess of 13 per cent of the company's 1939 sales of electric energy, according to R. E. Brennan, PGE treasurer and comptroller.

"The funds used to pay this huge tax bill were collected during 1939 from Portland General Electric company customers, not as taxes but as part of their bill for services rendered by the company," Brennan emphasized.

The \$1,316,372.74 figure represents property taxes alone. Taxes of all kinds amount to \$1,825,000 for 1939 or in excess of 18 per cent of revenues.
