Labor Shortage Rumors Untrue, Bulletin Says

Emphatic denial that there is any truth in a rumor of labor shortages in and around the city of Vancouver, Wash., is contained in a bulletin sent in the Hillsboro chamber of commerce this week by Earle Castle, executive secretary of the Vancouver chamber of commerce.

"We hear that rumors are afloat in several states that Vancouver, Clark county, Wash., is experiencing a labor shortage, and that an appeal is going out for workers. This is not true. We plead with you to help us stop these rumors."

"The industrial growth going on in Vancouver is comparatively small, rumors to the contrary notwithstanding. We have hundreds of unemployed on our rolls, and can get thousands more workers from Portland (just eight miles away), should we find it difficult to fill positions as they open up. An influx of laborers and their families expecting to find work here can only mean disappointment and, perhaps, tragedy for them."

"In all hiring for construction and operation of industries, both new and old, in this region, preference is given those who are already residents of this immediate vicinity. There is already a more than ample supply of labor available to take care of the need contemplated for the near future. Persons seeking employment in private industry are advised not to come to Vancouver."

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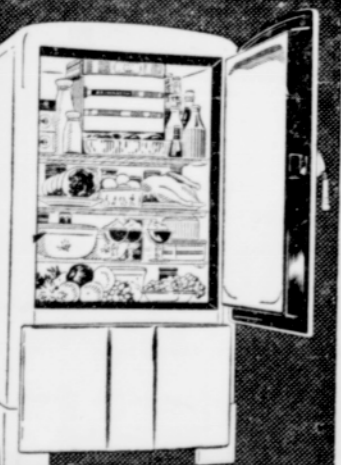
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
