Mrs. Ida Kays Dies at Scholls

SCHOLLS — Mrs. Ida Kays, 80, a resident of Scholls for many years, died here March 21 and funeral services were held Saturday at the local Methodist church. Interment was in Mountaineers cemetery.

Mrs. Kays was born in a suburb of Cleveland, Ohio, June 13, 1859, and was married to James B. Kays in Illinois January 24, 1882. Three children were born to the union, two of whom died, wife in 1915 and a baby boy in 1893. Mrs. Kays died in 1921.

She lived at various times in the states of Ohio, Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Illinois, Nebraska, Kansas, Missouri, Idaho and moved to Oregon in 1913, living here until her death. Beginning at the age of 14 and continuing at different periods until the age of 71, she taught school in seven different states. A writer of ability, she had many articles and stories published in leading papers and magazines, and two books published, one of which was a book of poems in 1926.

Deceased is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Florence Mounce, and two grandsons of Minot, N. D.; a brother, Martin Jones of Madison, W. Va.; a half sister, Mrs. E. A. Dunning of Pasadena, Cal.; and a half brother, Joseph Jones, of Portland.

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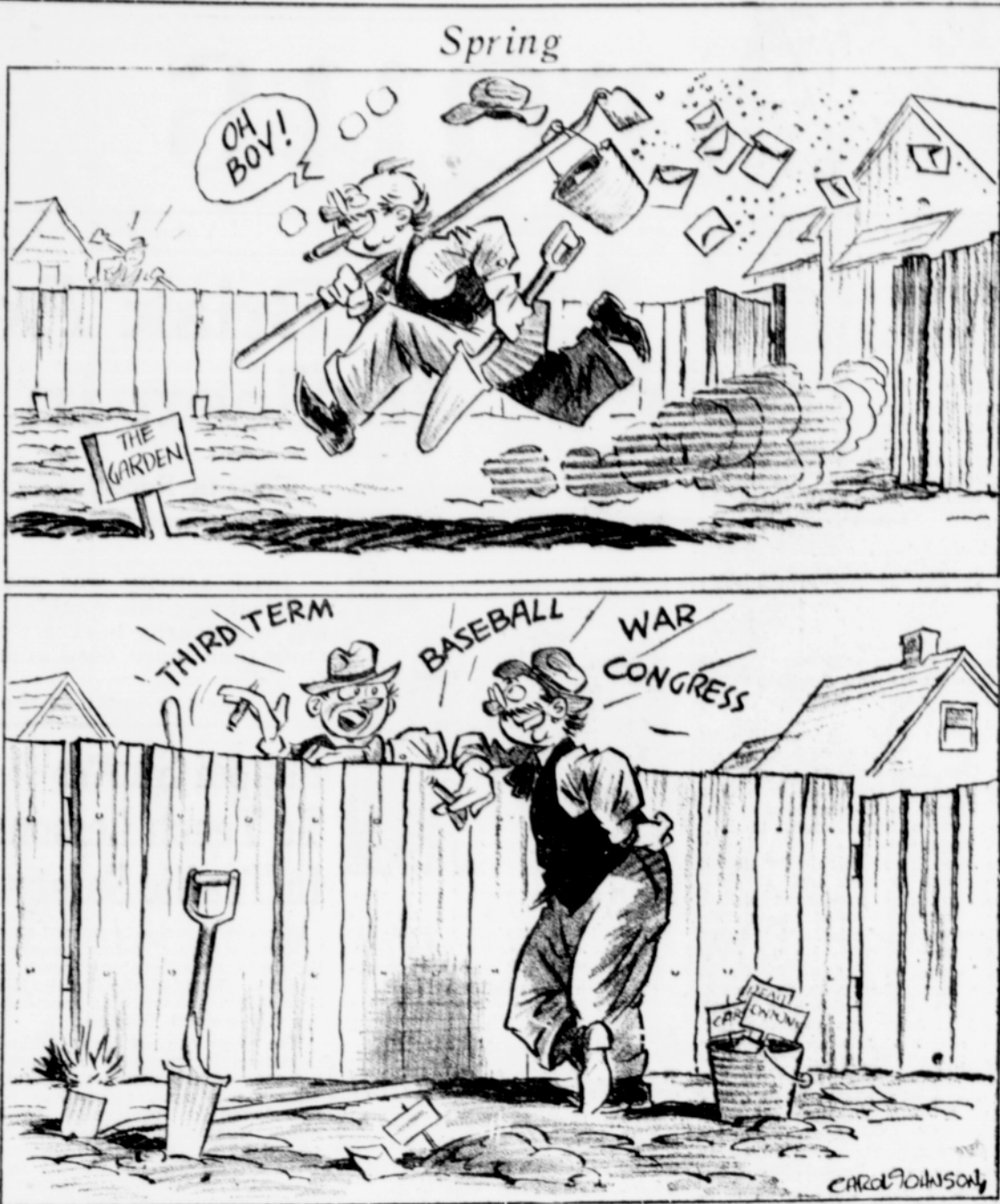
