Following precedent through generations of puppetry, the Madcaps will present a playlet for Hillsboro in which a new cast has been gathered to give their own interpretation of that well known stage presentation, "Epimanchus," the story of the little black "feller" who try hard as he may just can't keep out of trouble.

The Madcap Marionettes have recently been featured at such outstanding gatherings as the 4-H summer school under sponsorship of the Oregon State college extension bureau and at the Oregon state fair, where they played to crowds that repeatedly required extra shows be given.

During the past two years, community gatherings have enthusiastically received the Marionettes in Silverton, Independence, Monmouth, Corvallis and Salem, as well as at numerous private entertainments such as the librarian banquet following the dedication of the new Oregon state library.
