Spittle Bug Control with Rotenone Dust Advised by County Agent

Spittle bugs will before long be causing the strawberry grower some concern, says County Agent W. F. Cyrus. During the past few years growers have become rather well acquainted with control methods. Rotenone dust containing one-half of one per cent actual rotenone has proven effective if applied at the proper time.

Amounts of material to be used depend on the method of application, the number of plants per acre and the amount of foliage. If the rotenone dust application is carefully timed so that it is applied before the insects have become disoriented and all over the plant effective control can be made. Amount of material is possible than if dusting is delayed several days. Usually 60 to 80 pounds of dust per acre will be required.

Power Needed

On the larger plantings, it is almost necessary to use power equipment. When these are properly equipped with a hood long enough and dusting machine, effective job may be done. Some local growers who have used both methods maintain that a good hand duster operated with careful help is more efficient in getting an effective distribution of dusting material than is commonly obtained with the power duster. Success with the hand duster depends upon the care displayed in its use.

Most of the failures to control spittle bug with rotenone dust have been due to waiting until it was too late for effective control, or because of careless and inefficient application of the dusting material. If the dusting operations are delayed until the spittle bugs are scattered all over the plant and surrounded by a heavy protective covering of foam it is impractical to expect really effective control.

Weather Factor

Dust should be applied only when the weather outlook is reasonably favorable. In applying the dust it should be delivered into the plant so that it comes up underneath the leaves. Rotenone dust should not be carried over from year to year.

Strawberry root weevils are divided into several groups. The more common and most frequently found species are those that emerge as adults at about the time the berries are ripe. There is one species that emerges early in the spring. Some of the adults of this species have been out in Washington county for nearly three weeks.

In controlling strawberry root weevil, the poisoned bait that is used should be applied so that the adults are poisoned soon after they emerge and before egg laying has begun. Apple pomace baits are generally more desirable because they last longer and are usually somewhat more attractive to the root weevils. Bran baits are effective when properly prepared but they have the disadvantage of not lasting very long.

Arthur Griffith has built a new concrete foundation and remodeled the exterior of his home.

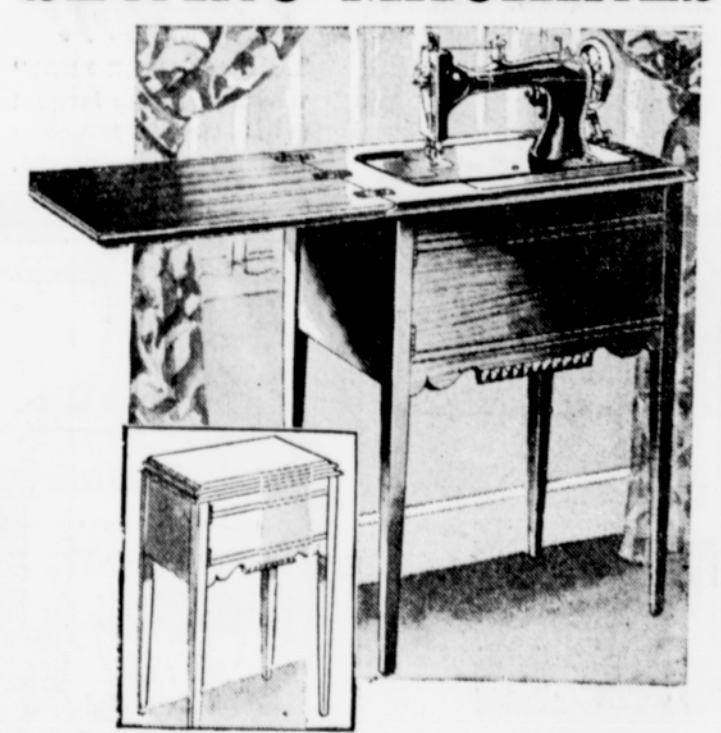
Goes to India

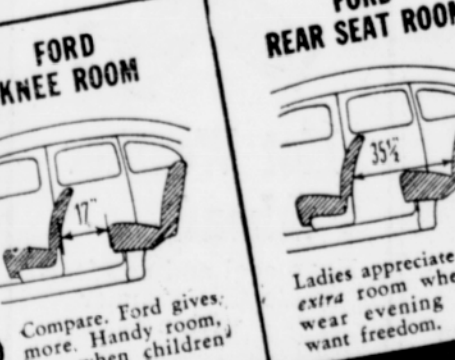
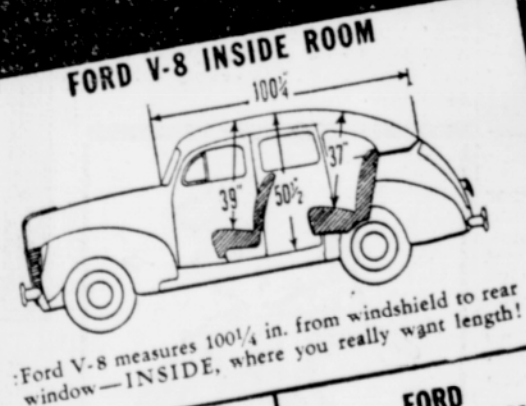
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
