

Norway Relief Campaign Begun By Red Cross

SAN FRANCISCO, April 13.—A. L. Schafer, manager of the Pacific branch of the American Red Cross, announced today that Chairman Norman H. Davis is instructing 3,700 Red Cross chapters in the United States to accept voluntary contributions for the relief of war sufferers in Norway.

Chairman Davis informed Mr. Schafer that the American Red Cross is awaiting word from the Norwegian Red Cross as to its exact needs.

"We are confident," Mr. Davis said, "that the American people will want to help the unfortunate Norwegian people in this sad hour in their history. An unexpected war has been thrust upon them and their suffering is all the greater because of their unpreparedness. We have called the Norwegian Red Cross asking what help it might require and we expect an answer shortly."

Mr. Davis said the Red Cross was studying how aid could be furnished to Norway in view of the blockade and other war conditions. "It is highly possible," he said, "that the Red Cross will have to charter one or more ships to carry relief supplies to Norway and Finland, flying under the Red Cross flag. They would certainly be allowed to pass unchallenged through the war zones."

In his communication to Mr. Schafer, Mr. Davis said the Red Cross is prepared to handle inquiries from Americans seeking to locate relatives in Norway.

In addition to considering relief for Norway, the Red Cross, Mr. Davis added, is preparing for the possibility that it may have to send relief ships to Greenland as suggested by President Roosevelt yesterday. Such aid may become necessary, he said, if normal communications with Greenland become disrupted because of the war.

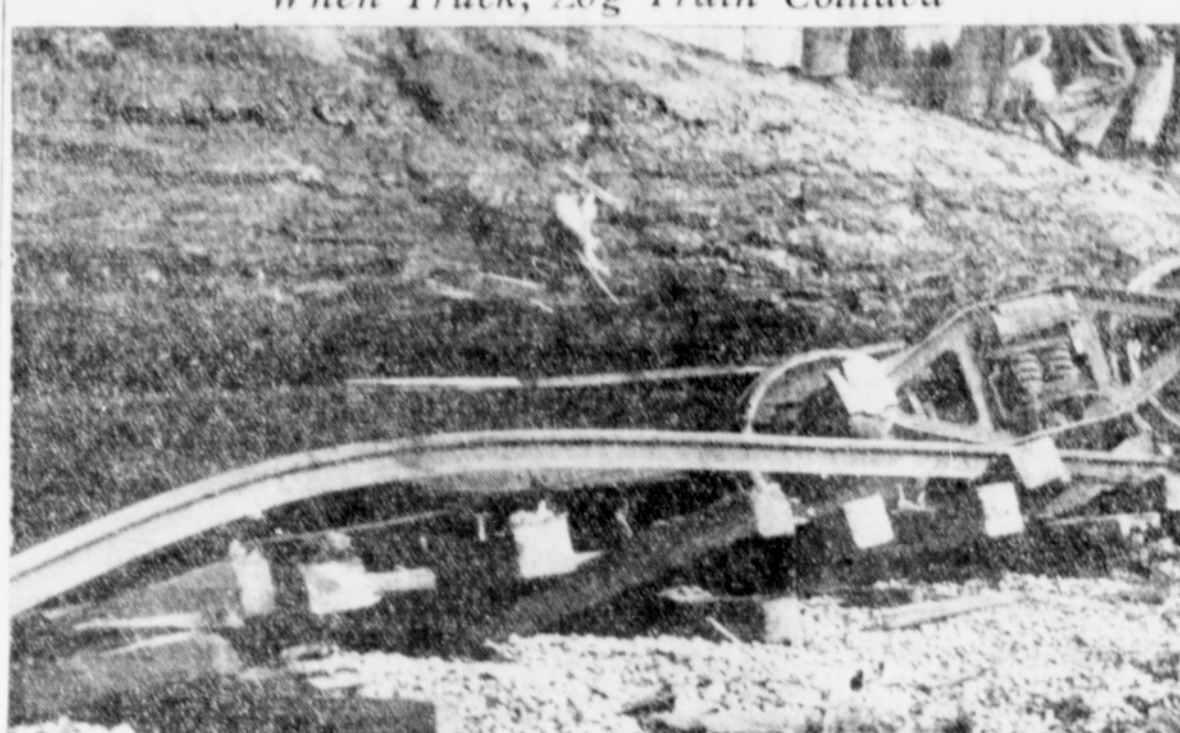
Former Resident Dies

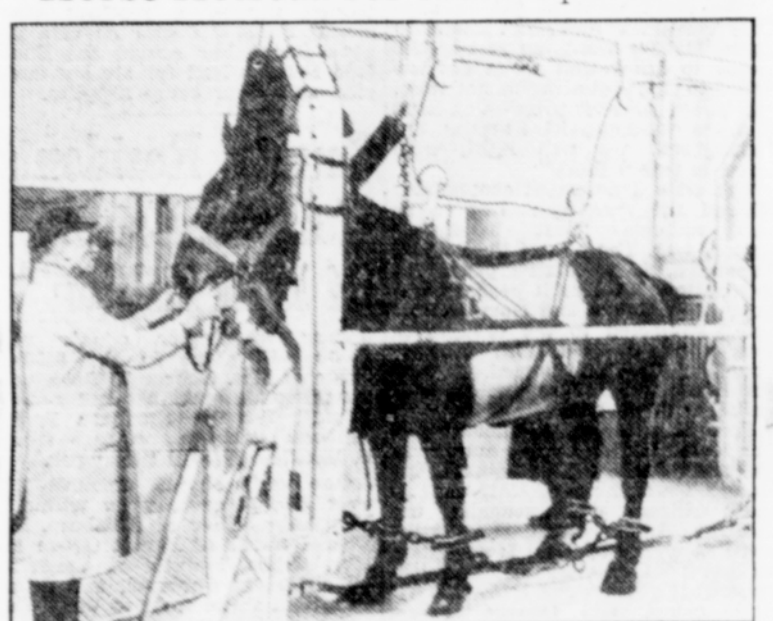
Last Party Tonight

which caught up on the limb and broke his leader.

Vern Casbeer, former Shell Oil manager in Hillsboro, and a companion fisherman, had a brush with death on the opening day of trout season Saturday when their boat tipped in the Nehalem river near Jewell and pitched them into the swift, treacherous waters.

After a half-hour struggle with the powerful current, they managed to reach shore and safety. All their fishing gear was lost in the mishap, which reportedly happened when their boat struck a submerged snag.

Supernatural might say that the Nehalem river accident occurred because the unwary couple ignored the fact that the opening day of fishing fell on the 13th of the month, but three Portland men who were fished in Justice A. W. Havens court Friday for angling out of season will testify that as far as law is concerned, the 13th would have been far luckier for them than the 14th on which day they were arrested.
