

County Schools Win Honors in Contest

Washington county high school musicians carried away with their share of honors awarded at the two-day sectional music contest Friday and Saturday in Oregon City.

In competition with high school musicians from all over northwest Oregon outside of Portland, Forest Grove and Beaverton took seven of 16 "superior" ratings awarded on the first day, which was devoted to piano and voice events. The Hillsboro Girls' Glee club entered in Class B, was rated excellent (second place), and the same rating was earned by the Hillsboro high school mixed chorus.
