

## Building Needs for Schools Told at P.-T.A.

Various phases of Hillsboro's grade school building needs were discussed by a panel of four selected to represent those phases Monday night at the Parent-Teachers' association meeting in the union high school.

J. W. Poynter, superintendent of Hillsboro grade schools, who had investigated widespread information on standards of modern school facilities, gave a comprehensive talk on that subject. Among the details mentioned were sizes of school rooms; unilateral lighting (lighting on one side of rooms only) to eliminate cross-lighting glare; gymnasium facilities, combined with and separate from auditorium health room; cafeteria standards calling for from 7 to 9 feet per pupil as compared to 3 feet in our B. W. Barnes school; heating, cleaning, and fire protection standards; and artificial lighting, one of Hillsboro's outstanding deficiencies.

Poynter had also prepared an illuminating exhibit of school houses of all types of construction throughout Oregon and the United States. A plan was suggested whereby the kindergarten and first three grades would be moved to the David Hill location with hope of constructing a new building there, and the remaining grades to be housed in the B. W. Barnes school which could be remodeled. The Peter Boscow school would be used for utilities such as cafeteria, workshops, art, etc. In this way it is thought that greater efficiency would be attained, the elementary grades and the pressure of over-sized classes would be relieved.

R. R. Easter, chairman of the school board, emphasized particularly the necessity of voters exercising their privilege to vote when a school program is put before them. He pointed out that the school board is the servant of the people and needs their support and help if Hillsboro is ever to better its school program. He urged that differences be overlooked and a sound program go forward with the support of every voter, as no school program can be initiated on a minority vote.

Mrs. S. W. Melhuish spoke on "What I Want for My Child in School Facilities," and directed her talk along lines of cost, construction, and location, pointing out that all these factors must combine toward the best education and sound bodies of her children so that they might emerge happy and useful citizens.

P. A. Anderson, speaking on "What the Taxpayer Thinks About a School Building Program," presented statistics regarding school millage in the State of Oregon, property valuation and total millage for several representative cities. He also reported that in a number of interviews with taxpayers, an almost unanimous majority expresses opinions favoring a conservative building program with the David Hill school site getting first preference.

The musical program offered at beginning of the meeting met with enthusiastic applause. Miss Lucille Fisher presented a fourth grade girls' quartet composed of Frances Campion, Barbara Barrows, Kathryn Reule and Mary Lou Anderson. A mixed chorus from B. W. Barnes sang two numbers led by Miss Fisher.

Officers for the coming year were installed. Mrs. R. P. Rasmussen doing the honors. Mrs. P. L. Patterson is president. Mrs. T. H. Bailey, vice-president. Mrs. Jennie Hurst, second vice-president. Mrs. W. L. Henry, treasurer; and Mrs. George Reule, secretary. Mrs. Rasmussen read the aims and ideals of Parent Teachers and dedicated the association, anew, to its worthy purposes, calling for a plaid from its members. Mrs. Patterson accepted the honors for all the officers, thanking T. G. Bronleewe, retiring president for an association in good order.

Refreshments followed informal questions from the floor following the panel discussion. Mrs. R. R. Easter was in charge of refreshments, assisted by Mrs. J. W. Poynter and a committee composed of: Mrs. H. E. Campion, Miss Tennessee Weathered, Miss Mary Yoder, Mrs. Grant Van Doren, Mrs. A. J. Foelker, Mrs. T. C. Foelker and Mrs. J. Brugla.

There will be no May meeting of the association.
