Effective in Aerial Combat

TOP—Designed to attack invading enemy bombers between the time when the alarm is sounded and before they reach their objective, the Curtiss-Wright Interceptor-Fighter shown in flight here, climbs well over a mile-a-minute and is reputed to be the fastest climbing plane in the world. It is powered by a 1000 H. P. Wright Cyclone engine and is equipped with four machine guns which fire through the propeller disc. The plane is more effective than anti-aircraft batteries in combating high-flying enemy bombers because of the mobility and rapidity with which it may be directed against attack by the use of radio communication with ground and air forces.

BOTTOM—The most picturesque and popular of the many religious processions of which Rome, as capital of the Catholic world, is the center is that of the Association of the Pages of St. Anthony.
