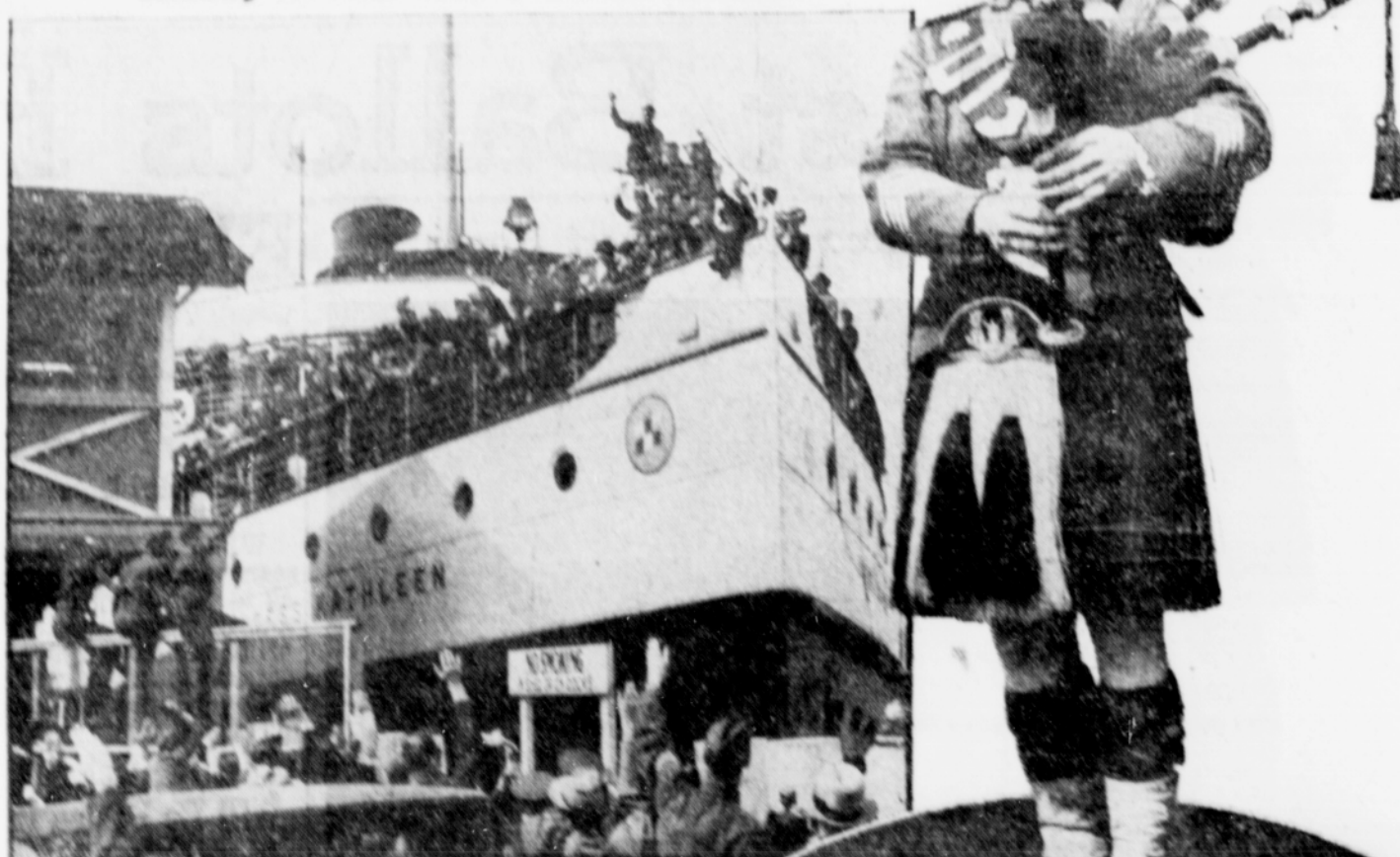

Motorlog Car Finds Tourists Welcome In Canada

IN CO-OPERATION with the Oregon State Motor Association, this newspaper presents the first of a series of motorlogs designed to be of service to Pacific Northwest motorists. Today's motorlog has been condensed from a full-page article in the May 12 Sunday Oregonian.

OUR VISIT to the wars in Canada began right here at a Portland bank. Into the wicket labeled Foreign Exchange we pushed 50 American dollars.

"Canadian dollars, please?"

The teller, in exchange, returned a bank draft for \$7 and one-half dollars guaranteed by the Dominion of Canada.

Seven and one-half dollars profit for the asking.

The American dollar advantage, within the boundaries of the United States, varies from 12 to 17 per cent. In Canada they have stabilized the exchange at 10 per cent, so our 50 American dollars, up north,

would have purchased 55 Canadian dollars.

With profit in pocket we drove The Oregonian-AAA motorlog car to Seattle's midnight ferry; then slept our way to an 8:45 A. M. arrival in Victoria.

The war? Surely there must be a war... We want to see a war... the kind of war where you hold the other fellow's coat. To our considerable astonishment.

There are no wartime restrictions on American citizen tourists. One exception... Are you a resident of the United States and a citizen of Germany? Sorry, sir, you are not invited to Canada. Not this season.

Prices, so far as the observer and his Purchasing Department could determine, have not been upped. The supply of numerous import articles is due for exhaustion before long.

A good many uniforms are in evidence on the streets. Small crowds gather to read war bulletins in newspaper windows.

There are just a few window cards announcing benefits for the Y. M. C. A. and kindred service organizations. An occasional small draft leaves by boat for Vancouver, or destination unknown. If you prowl sufficiently you will find some training camps. Pictures? Ask permission and sometimes it will be granted, and pleasantly, too.

Otherwise there is no evidence of war in Victoria save in conversations with the citizenry. They are neither depressed nor jubilant nor bored nor happy. They have a job to

do, an unpleasant job, and they try not to meditate upon the possible fate of the smiling young men who, khaki-clad, wave good-bye as the boat slips away from the inner harbor.

Victoria remains the delightful city of former years. The gardens grow more handsome. Time is ample there; the hours are long. He who seeks rest and moderate recreation... or a war... can do no better.

On the return trip there is the lovely Hood Canal drive, including Olympic national park, or a swing around the west side of the Olympic loop. Or a return to the mainland via the San Juan Islands.

To your advantage, in every way, is a trip beyond the border. As for Canada, she extends to you and to your dollars a cordial invitation. Not you, but your dollars, will help fight a war.
