Artesian Well Produces 15,000 Gallons Per Day

An artesian well producing about 15,000 gallons of water per day has been drilled in recent weeks and is now being used on the William Ruefner farm between Banks and Mountlake, according to a report from F. W. Livermore of the Beaverton Well Drilling company. The water source was tapped at a depth of 150 feet, Livermore said. There are three or four other artesian wells in the county but they are all much deeper. The output of the Ruefner well is large enough to meet all his farm needs.

With the well site located on a level some eight feet above the barn, gravity produces force to supply the farm building with water, Livermore stated. Of incidental interest is the fact that the well was located by Rudolph Schuepbach of Beaverton, who is widely known in the county as a "scientific water finder."

There is an artesian well on the Henry Carstens place in the same section, near Roy George and Ethel Corey own the place now.

Pea Dusting Start Expected Within Week

If the weather of the past week continues pea weevil dusting operations are expected to be in full swing by the last of the week, according to W. F. Cyrus, county agent, Messers Chamberlin and Boon of the federal bureau of entomology state that beginning early last week the adult weevil have been moving rather rapidly from winter hibernation. Peas are beginning to bloom and unless cold or rainy weather checks their activity, most of them will probably be in the fields before the week is over.

More than 200 growers attended the field meetings last Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, at which information was presented pertaining to the dusting program. Some weevil were found in all the fields at that time but only in limited numbers, so the flight movement was only beginning.

Roteneone dust of three-fourths of one per cent strength is the standard and recommended material to be used. Data collected from two years' field work indicates that the source of the rotenone is unimportant. That which is obtained from derrick, cube, or limbo being equally effective. As carriers, talc, diatomaceous earth or bentonite are all effective. If the material carries the required three-fourths of one per cent rotenone it can be expected to be effective if properly applied.

Growers and operators of dusting equipment should be prepared to put the equipment in operation the last of this week. Cool or rainy weather will delay the dusting operations. Definite notices will be mailed when it becomes positively apparent that dusting operations should begin.

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4-H Corn Growers Use Rigid Rule In Seed Program

"To Make the Best Better" is the rule which 4-H corn club members are using in the production of their Minnesota 13 seed which they are again marketing with the 4-H seed corn tag certifying that the germination is 95 per cent or better and which is an indication that the corn is of an approved quality and has been re-cleaned and graded, according to Palmer Torvend, assistant county agent.

More rigid rules as to the type and quality of seed accepted this year has caused a marked decrease in the number of pounds of seed available. Dry conditions during last year's growing season also had considerable bearing on this elimination, and only the best corn is used for this seed.

This corn has been grown in Washington county for a number

of years by the 4-H club members and is well acclimated to local conditions. It has produced good yields of grain and is also suited for silage.

Person is Named To National Board
