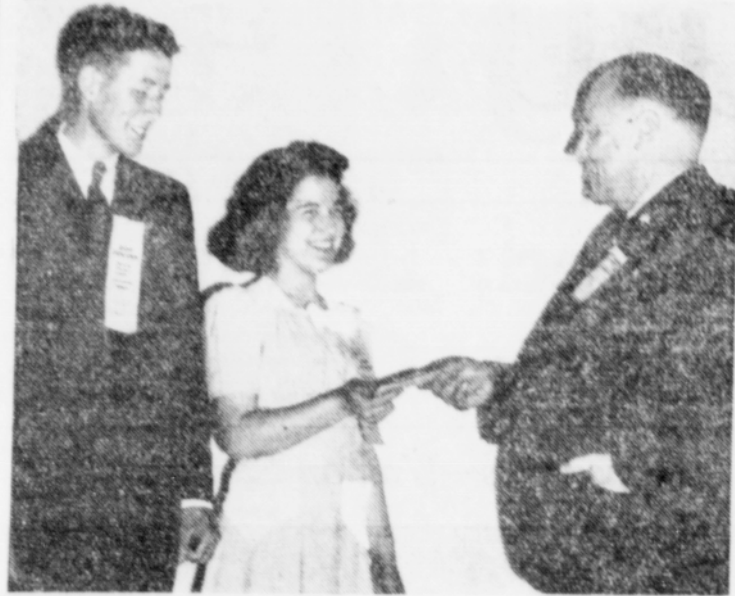

"man with the torch"—the incendiary—but the balance, 63 per cent, are due to carelessness of woods visitors and others of the general public.

**Reforestation Started**

The other phase of the forest conservation program, reforestation, is already getting its start among large logging operators who are taking a long-range look into the future. As for "sustained yield," an examination of statistics will demonstrate how far away this eventuality is, Cronmiller said. In Oregon today we are cutting about 4.1 billion feet of lumber annually and this figure is destined to rise considerably because Washington timber is fast being depleted. It is estimated that the additional timber being produced annually by young growth in the state of Oregon is about 1.4 billion feet and that in-

sect ravages and decay, on the other hand, eat away this amount of timber more in the same period.

If all of Oregon's virgin timber were to be cut and young trees planted on the land, the growth production would be only 4.5 billion feet per year—possibly "sustained yield," but the toll on our forests from fire is not included in these arithmetical deductions.

### Loss Total Huge

Fires in the last 10 years have laid waste 1,600,000 acres of forest. This loss, figured on an annual basis, shows that about 1.4 per cent of our total forest lands every year are being destroyed by fire. In order to insure continued forestry, the loss from fire will have to be reduced to two-tenths of one per cent per year, or 24,000 acres loss from fire annually.

The loss from forest fires last year was 300,000 acres of timber. Although approximately \$1,000,000 was spent to combat these blazes, a "very poor job" of control resulted, the assistant state forester concluded, adding that if and when funds made available to bear 50 per cent of more of the expense of fire prevention and control, the private logging firms will have added responsibility in the matter of carrying on a proper reforestation program.

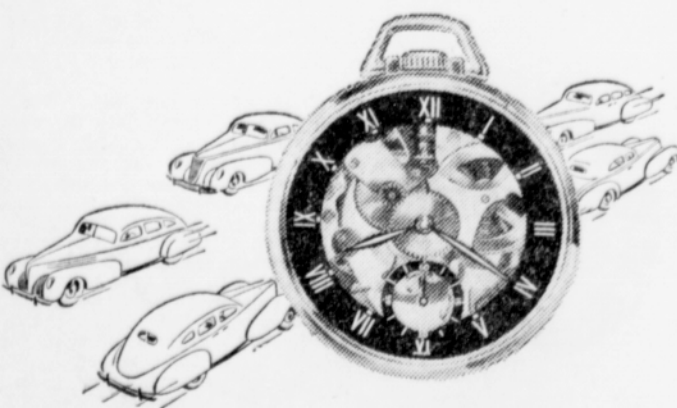

"These last two weeks of school have been exceedingly busy ones," according to J. W. Poynter, superintendent. "The rounding out of the year's work includes hours of detailed clerical work that really puts quite a burden on the teachers. Giving achievement tests, scoring them, making individual profiles, and the making of the class analysis charts—which is the consolidating of all profiles on one chart—is a long, hard task, but so worth the time

and effort that teachers are glad to do it. These charts give us a black and white statistical picture that reveals some very interesting facts.

"In addition to the achievement tests is the job of bringing permanent record cards up to date. In fact they are being made for the first time as a new much more complete and much more comprehensive system. Adequate school records are very important, and, sad to say are lacking in many schools. All through the year valuable information concerning children is collected and filed in the individual file folders. They help greatly in determining the best course of action to take with the child when a problem arises.

"Such problems arise at the end of the year when it becomes the teacher's duty to say whether the child for his own good should be passed, advanced or retained. We give parents our honest opinion on that matter and it is not often that parents insist upon a course of action contrary to our opinions.

"In closing, we wish to extend our appreciation to all persons who have cooperated with us so nicely throughout the year."
