

High School Budget Passed; Election Set

A budget of \$64,757.14—well within the six per cent limitation and only about \$250 more than the corresponding figure for last year—was passed by the union high school board in meeting with its budget committee Monday night, and June 24 was set as the date for legal voters of the high school district. No. 3, to vote on the proposed tax levy.

The tentatively adopted budget shows total estimated expenditures for the coming year as \$89,260 and total estimated receipts as \$24,502.86, leaving the balance to be raised by district tax. Included in the schools' program of improvement for building and grounds is installation of an irrigation system for the campus facing Lincoln street and Sixth avenue, work on which started Tuesday morning. Pipe is being supplied by the Gates plant here.

M. Stretcher, B. M. Goodman, W. G. Ide, W. V. Bergen and Edgar Rehse served on the district budget committee. The board is composed of M. P. Cady, chairman, T. P. Goodin, John Gates, William McNay, and John Kamra, retiring member, whose petition for re-nomination as candidate to succeed himself has been filed with the clerk. Fred Engeldinger, post commander, and J. W. Poynter, chaplain, took leading parts in the ceremony, which concluded with a flag-raising by Sea Scouts while the solemn assemblage joined voices in a mass singing of the national anthem.

The memorial ceremony at the G. A. R. monument, in late years carried on by the Legion by request of the Civil War veterans' organization, followed the G. A. R. manual, including reading by Verne McKinney of General John A. Logan's order of May 5, 1868, designating May 30 as Memorial Day, and reading of Lincoln's Gettysburg address by Hugh S. Rogers, past commander of the U. S. W. V. Commander Engeldinger took the part of G. A. R. commander and Chaplain Poynter, of the G. A. R. chaplain.

Field Meetings Monday, Tuesday To Study Grasses

Six grass field meetings are scheduled in Washington county for Monday and Tuesday, June 3 and 4, according to County Agent William F. Cyrus. E. R. Jackson, extension agronomist of the Oregon state college, will be with the county agent and Palmer Torvend, assistant county agent, at these meetings.

The complete schedule is as follows: Monday, June 3—9:30 a. m., A. H. Evers farm 3 miles north of Forest Grove; 1:30 p. m., Elmer Guerber farm, 8 miles north of Hillsboro, near Helvetia; 3:30 p. m., A. W. Connell farm, near Lincoln station. Tuesday, June 4—9:30 a. m., Agent William F. Cyrus, E. R. Jackson, extension agronomist of the Oregon state college, will be with the county agent and Palmer Torvend, assistant county agent, at these meetings.

Grasses Seeded
More than twelve varieties of grass were seeded on the A. H. Evers place in the fall of 1937. These have been pastured from time to time during the present spring. On the Guerber place at Helvetia, where grass seed production has become a major cash crop, extensive seedings of tall and chewing fescue are in production. Part of these seedings are five and six years old. Some of the tall fescue is seeded in rows and fertilizer trials were established some parts of the seed, in March of this year.

A. W. Connell has a seeding of meadow foxtail which has been particularly good. Meadow foxtail is adapted to wet land and is increasing in use. Chewing fescue seeded in 1939 will be observed on the Amos Watkins farm. This grass, as well as others, offers possibilities for seed production and pasture on hill lands where erosion control is important. Both chewing fescue and tall fescue on the Wohlshlegel

place will be harvested for seed this year. These seedings are made on hill land.

Crash Injuries Prove Fatal

Matures Early
On the G. W. Borland farm there is a seedling of bulbous bluegrass with hop clover. Bulbous bluegrass is an early maturing grass, perennial in habit, that offers possibilities on some of our hill lands. The value of seeding a legume with grass has been demonstrated at various places where pasture practices are well established from long years of experimentation. The seeding on the Borland place of grass and legume is interesting from the standpoint as well as for the opportunity to observe the bluegrass alone.

Jackman, the agents and growers will discuss methods of seeding, cultivation and particularly harvesting practices at these meetings. There will be probably somewhere near 400 acres of grass cut for seed in Washington county during the month of June. Some of the hill lands which have been working with these grasses have acquired experience that is of value to any other grower.

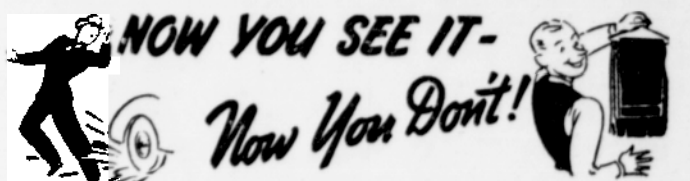

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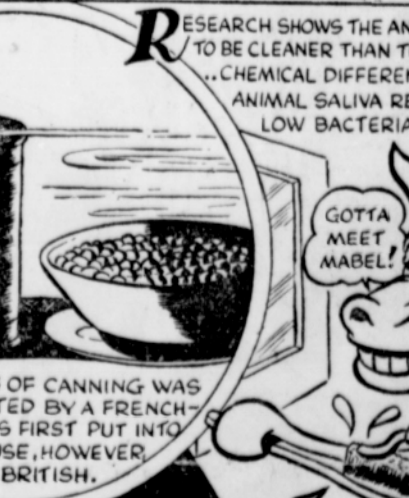
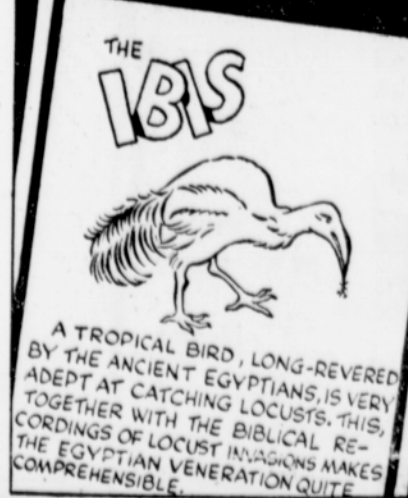
