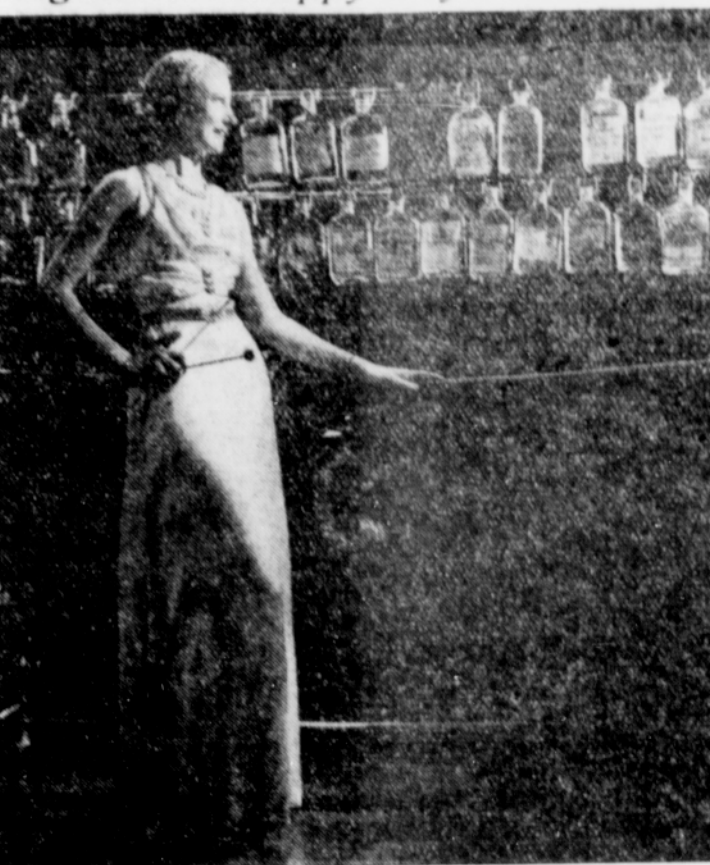
Leave for East

BEAVERTON — Beaverton's annual flower festival will be held Saturday. Sections will include the following: Lilies, low growing flowers, roses, delphinium, flowering trees or shrubs, collection of long stemmed flowers, perennials grown from seed, collections of wild flowers and glasses, collections of herbs, cacti or succulents, flower arrangements, table arrangement, arrangement of white flowers in white container using one other color for accent, best arrangement in bowl, vase, basket or other container and miniature arrangements for adults and for children. Exhibits for competition are open to amateurs only and only one entry may be made in each class. Entries will be accepted from 9 a. m. to 11 a. m. Saturday. All flowers exhibited in any section must be grown by exhibitor, sweepstakes to be awarded to the outstanding exhibit in the show. Containers must be marked with owner's name on adhesive tape, placed on the bottom of container. Beaverton community garden club will not be responsible for containers or other property.

High Students Step Up

Alviston, Ontario—"During my visit here one fellow walked down to the hotel with me and mentioned that he was not yet a Christian and said he wanted to be." So begins the recent monthly report of the worker among High School and College young people as he covered that city. Alviston The worker adds big question before he left the hotel that night. He went home a saved soul.

"Another lad came to my room the following morning and asked how to go about it to become a missionary. He had been reading some of our Inter-Varsity Christian Fellowship books in the school library and envisioned a life of service for the people that sit in darkness and under the shadow of death." A few questions revealed that this chap was not a saved man himself but before he left the hotel an hour later, he had yielded his life over; being born again by receiving Christ as Saviour and Lord. Under a local sponsor, who directs

them, these student groups come together for Bible study and prayer and an occasional social hour. In Alviston they meet in the high school building and the report adds: "The meetings continue large. There have been nine conversions in the group thus far this year. Again further on we read as to the Niagara high in Windsor, Ont. "This group was started at the request of the principal and has his active co-operation."

"This old organization—The Inter-Varsity Christian Fellowship, for years gave attention to colleges only, but of late in Canada has added the high schools. It has only entered this side of the line the past two years and the reports tell of a hunger among our own college men and women for something solid and eternal."
