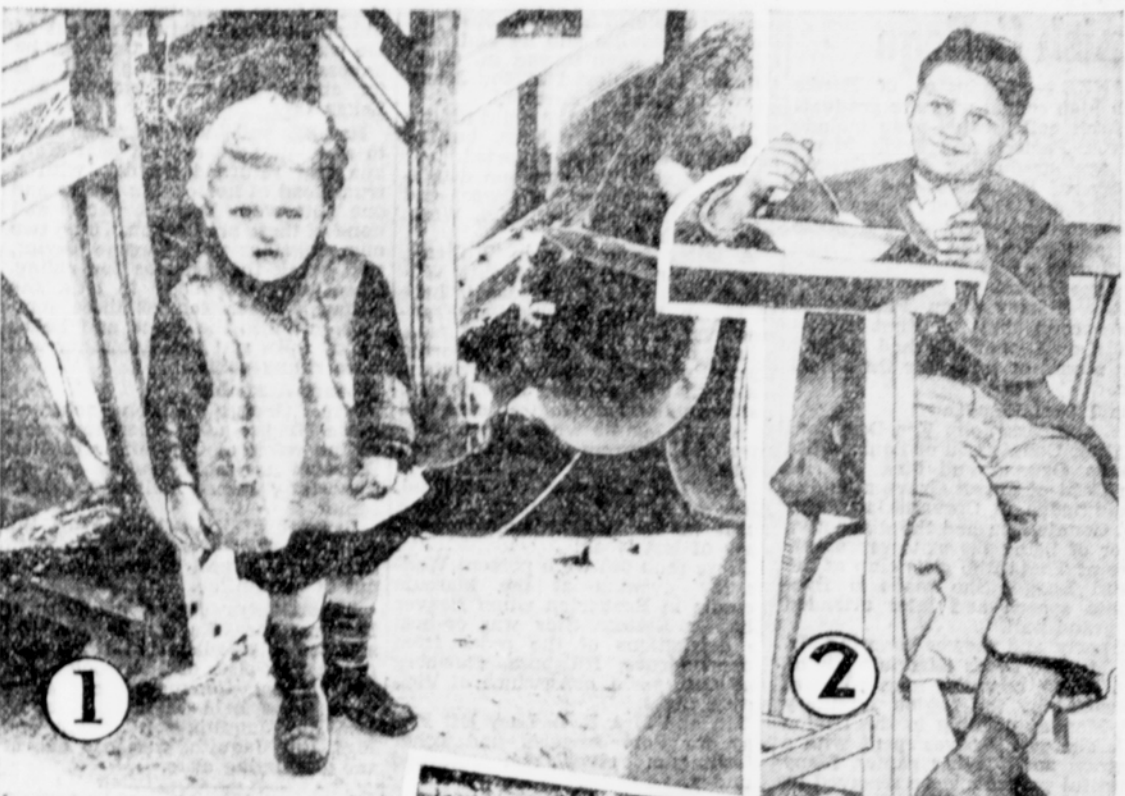

Refugee Children, Innocent War Victims, Appeal to America's Heart for Survival



"DEATH-DEALING" airplanes ride the skies. The carnage of their creation sweeps many lands. Armored tanks and motorized artillery roll across whole countries destroying, as in a blight, all standing in their way. Cattle, crops, homes, people—innocent and defenseless children—stand in fear, then in despair, only to fall into destruction. Some will live. They must be aided to endure, to struggle on, to survive.

This was the message directed to America's generous heart by Chairman Norman H. Davis of the American Red Cross, in asking prompt contributions to a \$10,000,000 war relief fund to be spent by the Red Cross for help to military and civilian wounded, and the homeless people of the warring nations.

"We must send relief as needed and not too late to be of use," Mr. Davis said. "We must send clothing, bedding, shoes, medications, surgical dressings and food."

Before the most recent devastation of neutral countries by aerial blitzkriegs was begun, the American Red Cross had sent 320,000 garments, knitted sweaters and hospital clothes for the women and children victims in England, Finland, France, Germany-occupied Po-

land and for Polish refugees in other countries. To the Red Cross societies of the nations engaged in battle, the Red Cross sent 933,000 surgical dressings. These garments and surgical dressings were made in 1,500 Red Cross Chapters throughout America. In addition, the American Red Cross purchased medicines, shoes, blankets, knitted underwear and almost a thousand other items at a cost of \$1,500,000 for shipment to the Red Cross societies of belligerent nations.

But with destruction, suffering, and thousands of wounded added each day to the frightful toll of war as new nations became involved, the American Red Cross appealed to the nation for at least a ten million dollar relief fund. Contributions can be made to the local Red Cross Chapter in any community in America, Mr. Davis said.

Damage Suits Seek \$30,000 For Injuries

Two circuit court suits—both arising from accidents—seeking aggregate damages of over \$30,000, were filed in the county clerk's office this week. The first action, \$20,000 general damages for injuries allegedly suffered by Elmer Chappel, a car driver, was filed against the Shell Oil company truck, the second suit brought against the oil company as a result of the accident.

Cora Burns, a passenger in the Chappel car, filed for damages of \$50,000 last week. The accident allegedly occurred on December 21, 1939, at the intersection of the River road and Minter bridge road. L. W. Tippery was named in the complaint as driver of the truck.

Car, Train Crash
The second action, filed this week Douglas Starr, a minor, and his guardian ad litem, Paul Starr, against the Oregon Electric Railway company, seeks \$10,000 damages for injuries allegedly suffered by plaintiff when an automobile driven by Herschel Dunn and in which plaintiff was a passenger crashed into the side of a freight train on the crossing of Highway No. 8 at Tigar.

The complaint charges that a lighted crossing signal, depended upon by Dunn as a warning of trains was not working and that Dunn drove his car into the train before he was able to see the highway was obstructed. The accident allegedly occurred on February 25, 1940, at 1:30 a. m.

Rotarians Hear Farm President

Aims and objects of the Farmers Union were outlined by Harley Libby of Jefferson, state president, in speaking before the Rotary club last Thursday. C. C. Weber was program chairman.

He described the Farmers' Union as a service organization for the farmer, pointing out that there was a great deal in common as those things that help the farmer are reflected in better conditions for business men. President Libby said the Farmers Union did not want to run all business, but that there were some lines of definite value to them.

Too much thought may be given at times to the consumer problems, but the organization is planning to give more attention to marketing problems now, he said.

Program of the organization as outlined seeks (1) taxation based on ability to pay; (2) farm financing at low rates and over long periods; (3) education and (4) cost of production for farm products.

President Libby declared that his group is not looking for any cure-all, that the problem is theirs and that they intend to work it out. He also told of the work of the Farmers' Union juniors and of how the parent organization was helping them in education, in encouraging a sense of humor, sportsmanship and loyalty, and in stimulating initiative.
