Spray Cherries Now for Fruit Flies, County Agent Says

Cherry fruit flies have begun emerging from the ground. These flies will begin laying eggs within a few days to a week of the time they emerge. After the eggs are laid, the cherries will not be free from worms. To be effective, the fly must be killed before egg laying begins.

Various varieties of cherries should be sprayed now, says County Agent W. F. Cyrus. One spray application is inadequate for complete control. Three are recommended. The second one should be applied about seven days after the first one and the third application will depend upon emergence of the flies. Drenching the trees is unnecessary but a fine mist of spray should cover the entire tree. Interplanted trees and trees of any kind or variety adjacent to the cherry trees should also receive a spray application. The recommended spray is: Lead arsenate, 5 pounds; molasses, 5 gallons; Water, 100 gallons.

Spray Control Of Codling Moth

Apple and pear growers in the Willamette valley should apply the first cover spray now for the control of codling moth, according to an announcement from B. G. Thompson, associate entomologist, Oregon State college. For the past two evenings there has been a considerable flight of codling moths, and eggs have been deposited. Under ordinary Willamette Valley weather conditions, these eggs will hatch in six or eight days. The spray should be applied before these eggs hatch.

The recommended spray is powdered lead arsenate used at the rate of 3 pounds to 100 gallons of water. In orchards where codling moth is not a serious problem, two pounds of powdered lead arsenate to 100 gallons of water is sufficient to give control.

Other Spray Effective
Calcium arsenate, used at the rate of 3 pounds powdered calcium arsenate to 100 gallons of water, has been used successfully in the Willamette valley for codling moth control. Tests carried on by the entomology department of the Oregon experiment station over a period of seven years indicate that under Willamette valley conditions, calcium arsenate is only slightly less effective than lead arsenate in codling moth control.

Thoroughness of application is essential in codling moth control. The foliage as well as the entire surface of every apple and pear should be thoroughly covered with the spray solution. If worm injury is to be prevented, special care should be taken in spraying the upper portion of the tree, as more than half of the codling moth eggs are laid in the upper third of the tree.

Mrs. Lilly Bertha Morley, 75, resident of Forest Grove for many years, died at the Emanuel hospital in Portland May 23 after an illness of 11 months. Funeral services were held at Forest Grove Undertaking company chapel Sunday with Rev. R. L. Putnam of Hillsboro officiating. Interment was in Forest View cemetery.

Born in Tarville, Wis., May 21, 1865, she was married to Leonard Grant Morley in Virgova, Wis., in 1885 and came to Oregon in 1890. Ten children were born to the union. Mr. Morley died in 1928. Deceased is survived by the following sons and daughters: Mrs. Florence Burke, Buxton; Mrs. Olive Craig, McKenna, Wash.; Mrs. Glee Turburt, Eugene; Mrs. Mae Wagner, Forest Grove; W. O. Morley, Hillsboro; Millard Morley, National City, Cal.; and Joseph Morley, Forest Grove. Twenty grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren also survive. A sister, Mrs. Agnes Helgeson, lives at Dallas.

Guilty Verdict Returned Against Aloha Teacher

Rolox P. Prillaman, 38, Aloha-Huber teacher, was found guilty by a circuit court jury here Friday of failing to stop at the scene of an accident near Beaverton on March 3 in which Melvin C. Teschner, 22, Aloha bicyclist, was killed.

The jury, after visiting the accident scene and sitting through three days of trial testimony, returned the guilty verdict after only approximately 30 minutes of deliberation. No date has been set by Judge R.

Frank Peters for sentencing of Prillaman, who was granted an extension of liberty time on bail already posted in order to give his counsel time to file for a new trial.

Prillaman was arrested after the grand jury here returned a true bill, which in the opinion of District Attorney G. Russell Morgan amounted to a hit-run charge. Prillaman's defense contention was that the accident victim had already been struck down before his car arrived on the scene.
