Although birth dates tell of advanced years, both Mr. and Mrs. Smith are physically strong and active, youthful in spirit and contented in the various interests of their home. Mr. Smith, who answers to the nickname of "Old Chap" when spoken to by his life partner, was born in Port Royal, Penn., on September 15, 1865, and Mrs. Smith, whose maiden name was Alma L. Bennett, was born at Elk Point, S. D., on April 15, 1870.

Married in Missouri
They were married on June 4, 1890, in Missouri, where they made their home until 1901. At the time of his marriage, Mr. Smith had been a railroad employee for two years, and he continued at this work until 1906 to build up a record of 18 years' continuous service to his company without a day's leave from his job because of accidental injury.

The couple moved to Kansas City, Mo., in 1901 and to Hillsboro in November, 1913. They have been residents of Washington county since that time except for a period of four years, 1917-21, when they operated a farm in Southern Idaho.

Farmed Here
Mr. Smith farmed a 22-acre tract north of Corvallis from 1921 to 1925, and since that date has been a resident of Hillsboro. He was employed at the B. E. Maling cannery here until 1935, the last six years of his stay with this firm being in the capacity of preparation room foreman.

Gardening is a matter of pride in the Smith household. Well-kept flower beds, shrubbery and trees in the yard of their home tell of this avocation. Receiving special care and interest at the present time is a giant "carrot fern" standing about 12 feet high at one side of the front porch.

"I guess the first ten years are the hardest, as they say," Mrs. Smith

told an interviewer this week, adding "but in our experience, they were also happy ones."
