

Ten County Students Included In Largest OSC Graduating Class

Including two who will receive master's degrees, ten Washington county students are among the 793 who have completed courses at Oregon State college and are receiving their degrees this June in the school's largest graduation exercises. The class this year numbers 100 students over the record-shattering class of 1939.

These Hillsboro students, all receiving degrees in agriculture, are among the ten graduates from this county. They are Herbert Gnos, Victor Severin, Madsen and Chester Julius Wojahn. Master's degrees are being conferred upon two Forest Grove men, James Ferris Price in mathematics, and Jesse Robert Watson, in physics.

Other county students receiving "sheepskins" are Wilford Joseph Kalsch, Cornelius, agriculture; Leonard Lane Robinson, Tugard, agriculture; Harold Scott Huff, Beaverton, education; and Harold John Peterson, Beaverton, science. Philip Warwick Workman, Westfir, forestry.

The five county students receiving degrees in agriculture are members of the largest group ever to receive degrees in one class at Oregon State. The agriculture group included 144 graduates. Requirements for the bachelors degree at the seventy-first annual commencement June 3 have been completed by 716. In addition, 36 masters, three professional and four doctor of philosophy degrees bring the total for this year to 793 earned degrees plus four as honorary awards. Last year a previous record total of 663 were conferred.

Other school groups being graduated include engineering 138, education 56, home economics 163, secretarial science 90, forestry 94, nursing education 8, science 61 and pharmacy 17. An even larger percentage of the graduates than usual have positions waiting for them, deans report.
