### Cautions to Be Observed in Use of Flag

1. Do not permit disrespect to be shown to the Flag of the United States.
2. Do not dip the Flag of the United States to any person or anything. The regimental color, state flag, organization or institutional flag will render this honor.
3. Do not display the Flag with the blue field down except as a signal of distress.
4. Do not place any other flag or pennant above or if on the same level, to the right of the Flag of the United States.
5. Do not let the Flag touch the ground or the floor, or trail in the water.
6. Do not place any object or emblem of any kind on or above the Flag of the United States.
7. Do not use the flag as drapery in any form whatsoever. Use burning of blue, white and red.
8. Do not fasten the Flag in such a manner as will permit it to be easily torn.
9. Do not drape the Flag over the hood, sides or back of a vehicle, or of a railway train or boat.
10. Do not use the Flag as a covering for a ceiling.
11. Do not carry the Flag flat or horizontally, but always aloft and free.
12. Do not use the Flag as a portion of a costume or of an athletic uniform. Do not embroider it upon cushions or handkerchiefs, nor print it on paper napkins or boxes.
13. Do not put lettering of any kind upon the Flag. Note: It is nearly all the States the placing of letters on the Flag is prohibited by law.
14. Do not use the Flag in any form of advertising, nor fasten an advertising sign to a pole from which the Flag is flown. In nearly all the States the use of the Flag for advertising purposes is prohibited by law.
15. Do not display, use or store the Flag in such a manner as will permit it to be easily soiled or damaged.

Torn, soiled or badly faded flags should not be displayed. When a flag is in such condition that it is no longer a fitting emblem to display, it should be destroyed as a whole, privately, preferably by burning or by some other method lacking in any suggestion of irreverence or disrespect.

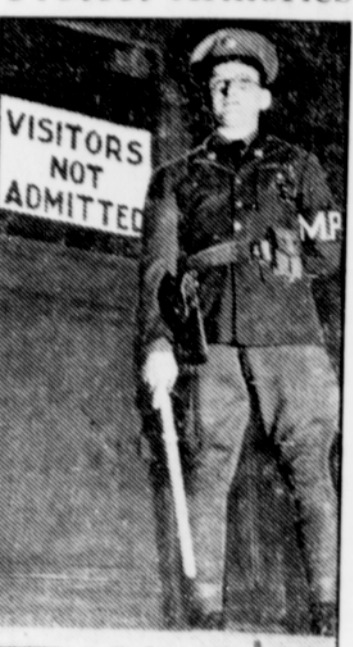
