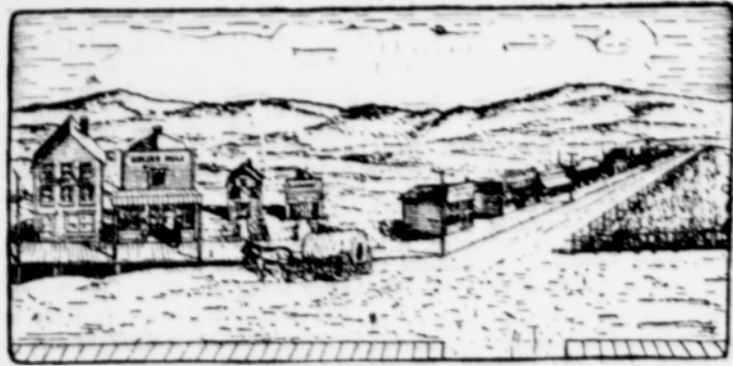


Penney Store Here to Observe Tenth Anniversary Wednesday



The end of ten years of service to county residents will slip by on Wednesday, June 13, for the J. C. Penney store here but not without a glance backward to consider the efforts and progress that have made these ten years according to P. A. Anderson, store manager.

The store here has since become a business on June 19, 1930, and William Gifford, local appliance dealer, is written in the store's history as being the first customer. Anderson, who is the branch firm's first and only manager, joined the Penney company in 1924 as a salesman in a downtown Portland store.

Started First Day
Mrs. Willis Pyle, formerly Mattie Cox, enjoys the distinction of being the only associate with a continuous employment record of ten years, having started as a salesgirl on the first day the store opened.

Commenting on his store's tenth birthday, Anderson said this week: "From the very beginning, the people of Hillsboro have been very cordial to this store, and we appreciate their patronage. We feel that we have shared in the progress of Hillsboro and hope that in some measure, we have contributed to it."

The Penney company and its policies are well known, not only in Hillsboro, but throughout the state and nation. There are now 40 Penney stores in Oregon, the first having opened in Pendleton in 1911, and 1562 stores in the United States.

First Store in 1902
This large organization, according to Mr. Anderson, has grown up in the past 38 years from a sound policy which characterized the first little store, opened in Montana in a mining community in 1902 by J. C. Penney, who has since become famous as the "man with 1,000 partners" because of the system he developed of giving each manager full control and a share of the profits in his particular store.

Central offices are maintained in order to make it possible for each store to enjoy the benefits of group buying and advantages of collective thinking on store management. Almost to the last officials of the Penney company go the start in business behind counters of Penney stores, Anderson declared.

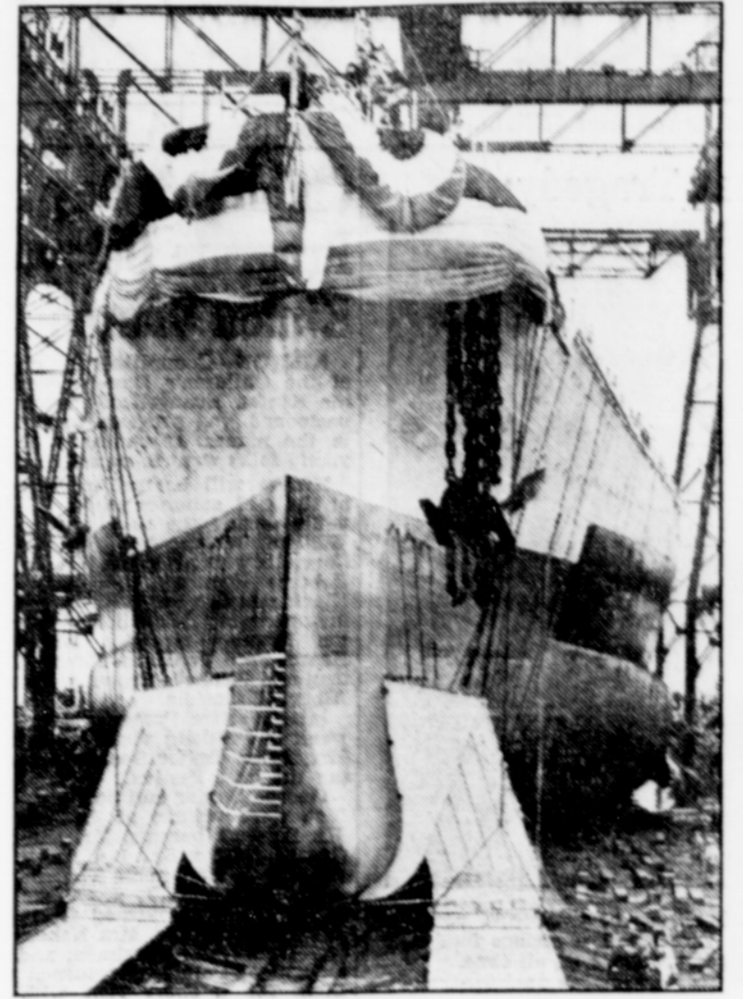
Former Railroader Dies at Orenco
