And here comes proof of the value of the preaching of the good gospel of loyalty.

Contrast that spirit with the destructive spirit of those who preach strike, sabotage, disorder. When men get together to amicably discuss and adjust differences, all involved benefit. The company for which they work goes ahead, making their jobs secure. There is no loss of pay caused by unnecessary layoffs. There is no feeling of bitterness and ill will. Yes, loyalty is good business—the kind of business that makes for progress and prosperity and stability in a business or a nation.—Industrial News Review.
