Staff Behind "Nation's Best Weekly"



Argus Career Started 'way Back In 1904 for Mrs. E. C. McKinney

Selection of the Hillsboro Argus in 1940 contests of the National Editorial association as the nation's top weekly has called attention to the fact that Mrs. Emma C. McKinney, associate editor and co-publisher of the Argus, is one of Oregon's foremost newspaper women in point of continuous years of service.

Her "fourth estate" career, which laid a firm foundation for the Argus as it is today, reaches back 36 years and more to a day when few women were daring to match business skill or enterprise with men, to a day when newspaper pictures were being used sparingly. When wirephoto was undreamed of, and the outbreak of the first World war as yet 10 years over future's horizon.

Bought Interest

Mrs. McKinney bought a half interest in the Argus in 1904 after having been associated with the Argus and the Independent for a number of years. She bought the other half interest in 1909.

The passing years found her continually at her desk. In 1923, following graduation from Oregon State college, her son and present editor, W. Verne McKinney, took over in a co-managerial capacity. With two printers, the veteran newspaper woman and her son shouldered the entire load of news gathering and writing, advertising service and the countless other tasks wrapped up in the publishing of a weekly paper. Mrs. McKinney was still putting in part time as a linotype operator.

Since that year, the Argus has grown steadily from a four-page sheet to a paper of 18 to 20 pages, from a staff of four to one of fourteen exclusive of 37 correspondents. Present members of the Argus staff, in addition to the McKinnies, are Ed C. Coman, advertising manager; Darrel W. Ellis, news editor; John Laurs, shop foreman; and Mabel Grass, Dorothy Harms, Dorothy Barr, Elma Bennett, Howard Hillis, Jerry Davidson, Sid Ratcliffe, Norman DeFrees and Don Foelker. Chemists Needed For National Defense Posts

In connection with the national defense program, the civil service commission is making an effort to secure, in examinations now open, qualified persons for meeting a prospective need for explosive chemists. Persons qualified are urged to apply at once for the civil service examinations now open for the various grades of chemist and chemical technologist positions in the Federal service.

In connection with the present national defense program it is extremely important that a large number of well qualified explosive chemists and chemical technologists be immediately available should vacancies occur in this field. The salaries for the positions for which this examination have been announced range from \$2,600 to \$4,900 a year.

Applications must be on file with the U. S. civil service commission at Washington, D. C., not later than June 24, if received from states east of Colorado, and not later than June 27, 1940, if received from Colorado and states westward. Copies of the announcements and the application forms may be obtained from Fred C. Holzner, secretary of the board of U. S. civil service examiners, at the Hillsboro post office or from the secretary of the board of U. S. civil service examiners at any first or second-class post office.

Hearing Date Set For Fire Protection

Public hearing on the proposed formation of a Forest Grove rural fire protection district has been scheduled for Wednesday, July 17, in the county courtroom here, according to Judge H. D. Kerkman.

Campaigns for organization of other districts in vicinities of Hillsboro, Beaverton, Aloha and Cornelius are going ahead meanwhile, it is reported. Cornelius councilmen and members of the fire department have slated a meeting for July 1 to discuss formation of a fire district there.

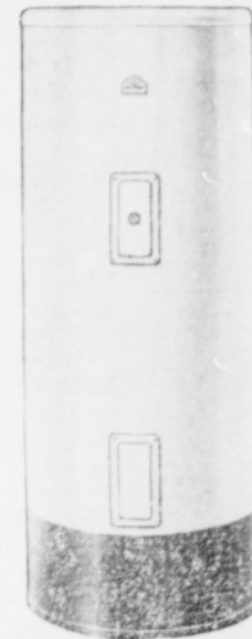

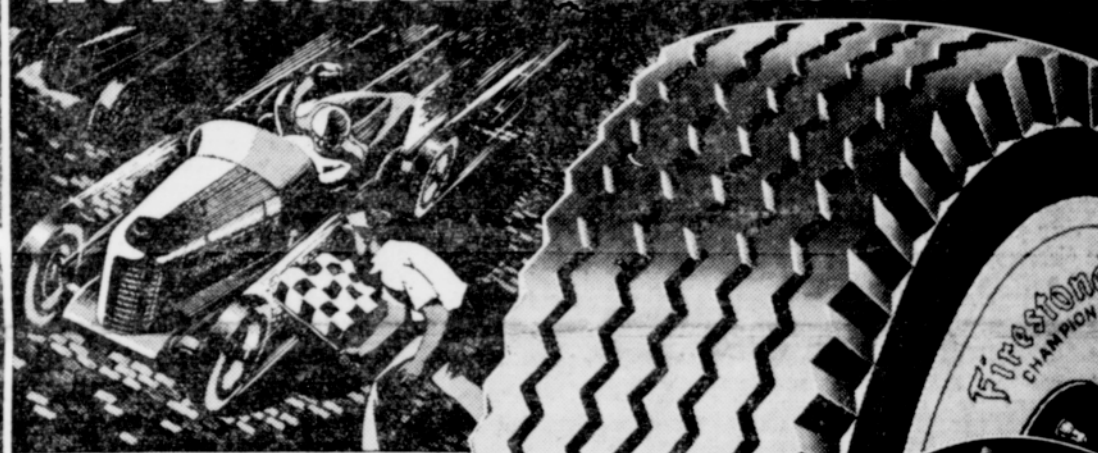
