

Gold Star Fathers Honored by Legion

"Your sons have not died in vain. America is resolved to this responsibility; is determined to go on fighting—if necessary—to keep the gains already made. We shall not allow the curse of dictatorship to come to the Americans."

Such were keynotes of reassurance given to Gold Star fathers, hosts and guests at an annual American Legion post meeting Tuesday night. Chaplain J. W. Poynter.

And to fathers and sons of Legionnaires, also honor guests, Poynter said: "I want to remind you that this responsibility is one that continues to be passed on from father to son until that hope—universal peace and security for our democratic way of life—is realized."

Futility Seen
Recalling that "World War No. 1 was heralded as the war to end all wars," Poynter asked the Gold Star fathers, "I am wondering just what is your feeling today?—it must be one of utter futility for it seems that wars are not ended, nor is democracy safe in any section of the globe."

The Legion chaplain, while expressing an opinion that it may take centuries to acquire a sufficient magnitude of sentiment to eventually outlaw war from the face of the earth, assured Gold Star fathers that "we are not standing idly by; that we are allergic to the talk of the pacifist; that we are alert to the devastating work of the fifth column; that we have decreed there is no place for dictatorship in this country; that the democratic form of government in its essence is still superior to all others; that sacrificing sons to the God of War is not a Christian ideal, and that we thoroughly believe differences can be peacefully arbitrated—thus avoiding the terrible bloodshed of modern war."

Ends on Optimistic Note
The strength of purpose with which America faces the future was summed up in Poynter's concluding words: "Our armament program is one not only for self preservation but for the preservation of a decent form of government and will be used if necessary to defend that form of government and to prevent its curse, dictatorship, from coming to the Americas."

"The fact that any nation will assume such a responsibility is hopeful that life sacrificed to war will eventually bring about those ideals for which the lives were sacrificed. So we must not let our faith falter; we must not give up hope; we must be determined to go on fighting—if necessary—to keep the gains already made. Gold Star fathers, it was your responsibility to sacrifice your sons for those ideals—it may be ours to do the same."

A large attendance of Legionnaires, their fathers and sons heard the thought-laden address. Leon S. Davis, newly elected commander of the local Legion post, was accompanied by both his father and son. (For details of election, see story on page one, section one.)
