

Scouts to Answer "Call of Wild" With Week Stay in Cascade Woods

Boy Scouts in the Hillsboro, Forest Grove and Tualatin districts will answer the "call of the wild" on Friday, July 5, when they pack up their tents, knapsacks, food and camp equipment and set out for Eagle Creek camp in the Cascade woods near Estacada.

Summer camp will last until July 13. The week interim will find the Scouts cooking their own meals by patrols, indulging in swimming, games, woodcraft, hiking and nature lessons.

Every Scout attending camp will have a physical examination card filled out by a registered physician and will present the card on registering at camp. Health at the camp will be supervised by an American Red Cross first aid specialist and a medical doctor, who will make periodic inspections. All swimming and water activities will be in charge of a life-saving expert.

Trading Post Started
A trading post will be operated at the camp for sale of candy, which, incidentally, will be limited to one bar per Scout per day. Toys, stationery, stamps, and other necessities will be available.

A handcraft shop will be open to those boys wishing to do craftwork. Instruction and materials will be available for leatherwork, wood-carving and patchwork building. Materials will be sold to Scouts for cost.

Visitors' day will be observed on Sunday, July 7, and Friday evening, July 12, which will be the court of honor night. Parents are being asked to confine their visits to this time so as not to disturb the boys' program.

No Hunger Strikes
From a cursory examination of the camp menu, it would appear the Scouts will not be complaining of hunger pangs. The first day's menu looks like this: Breakfast—Oranges, cold cereal, toast and butter, jam, bacon and eggs, cocoa; Lunch—Potato salad, bread and butter, sandwich meat, dry apricots, cookies, fruit punch, and Dinner—Soup, spaghetti and cheese, corn, bread and butter, rice pudding and milk.

Other Acts
Skill and aerobic act featuring "Sports Mathews" and "The former Greenfield" will bring music from old bottles, saws, frying pans, glasses, sleigh bells and myriad other strange contraptions in her bag of tricks. A clown act, guaranteed to cure the worst case of blues, will conclude the free entertainment bill.

Admission to Shute park will be free, ample free parking space has been rented for out-of-town cars, and there will be shady picnic spots, tables and outdoor stoves for those who may care to pack up a lunch, bring the family and make a day of it.

The afternoon of Wednesday, July 3, will be "Kiddies' Day," with admission to all mechanical rides reduced to five cents for children 12 years of age and under. The proceeds will be used for the coronation of the 1940 Goddess of Liberty.

Coronation of the 1940 Goddess of Liberty (Miss Mary Jane Butterfield) will be held in the Shute park pavilion at 9 p. m. Tuesday, July 2, with dancing to continue the rest of the evening. (See coronation story, page one, section one.)

Dancing in the municipal ballroom will start at 9 p. m. on Wednesday and at 7 p. m. on the Fourth.

Midget auto races, promoted by Bobby Rowe, will bring 16 to 20 professional drivers here for heats, helmet driving and night events on the new lighted oval speedway located just north of the park. Races will start at 8 p. m. on Tuesday and Wednesday and at 3 p. m. on the day of the Fourth. The speedway will also be the scene of races and contests open free to the public at 1:30 p. m. Wednesday. Prizes totaling \$35 will be offered in bicycle and tricycle races, pie-eating, cracker-eating, buck-saw and pole-climbing contests and many others.

Baseball Games Set
Baseball games will draw Happy Days crowds to the municipal ball park just across the highway from Shute park every afternoon. At 2:30 p. m. Tuesday, Hillsboro's Junior Legion will meet Salem Legion Juniors in an official district play-off game. Four Tualatin Valley league teams will be seen in action on following days. Verbena will battle Banks at 3 p. m. Wednesday and Dairy Creek will face Gaston at 12:30 p. m. on the Fourth. (For details, see story on sports page.)

The patriotic significance of America's Independence Day will be remembered on the Fourth with a parade through downtown streets and a patriotic program at the park immediately following breakup of the parade with Thomas A. Verdenius as the main speaker. Prizes totaling \$100 will be offered participants in the parade. (For details, see parade story, page one, section one.)

The Bethany band will be at the park on the Fourth with free concerts slated all day. A spectacular fireworks display, featuring a patriotic theme, will be seen at the park on the night of the Fourth as a climactic event for the three-day celebration.

Circular Tells How to Prepare Lawn Weed Killer

More complete directions for preparing and applying the new lawn weed killer which destroys broad-leaved weeds while helping the lawn grass have just been issued by the O. S. C. experiment station as circular of information No. 219, entitled, "Controlling Lawn Weeds with Sinox-Ammonium Sulfate Solution." Sinox is the commercial name for a thick, pasty yellow dyestuff with the gas-breaking chemical name of sodium-dinitro-ortho-cresol.

Experiments conducted by L. E. Harris, assistant agronomist, who is the author of the circular, proved that Sinox was much more effective as a weed killer when combined with ammonium which is a common commercial fertilizer valuable when applied to lawns.

Results Striking
While several factors about this method need further study, according to Harris, the results so far have been striking that the best methods now known for lawn weed control are being given to the public.

The directions for preparing the material call for dissolving one-third pound of Sinox in one gallon of water and one pound of ammonium sulfate separately in 1 1/2 gallons of water. The dissolved ammonium sulfate is then poured into the Sinox solution, while the latter is stirred vigorously. This combination is then applied with any kind of a sprayer which will produce a fine mist.

The 2 1/2 gallons is enough to cover approximately 250 square feet where an over-all spraying is necessary. Where the weeds are in scattered patches, or growing only in spots, it is desirable to spray only the weed patches by thoroughly wetting the leaf surface.

The material has been found effective on both kinds of plantain and the various dandelions, hop clover, Japanese clover, moss, and most of the broad-leaved and soft-leaved types of weeds. Successful treatments have been made from early May throughout most of the summer when the weather is clear and not excessively hot. In hot weather some burning of the grass occurs, but in every case it has recovered and grown better than before treatment.

Services were held at Pegg's chapel Friday. Rev. Willard Hall officiating. Interment was in the Lincoln Memorial cemetery.
