Delta Drug Store Celebrates
Half Century of Establishment

It is June, 1890. There is no growl of car engines or honking of horns to disturb the lazy drone of summer on Hillsboro's Main street. The most exciting bit of community talk concerns the opening of a new ultra-modern drug store by W. E. Brock and Ed Sells.

Some of the talk reflects concern of local business observers, for it seems that Brock and Sells have put a lot of money into the opening. It is everywhere known that three-fourths of the investment Brock and Sells have put into their new store has been spent for fixtures—lavish, ornate fixtures that size up with anything to be seen anywhere in the state—and the other fourth has purchased stock for the shelves.

"Seems a mite of extravagance—store probably won't last long," some skeptical son might have been heard to predict.

Store Still Here

And now it is June again—June 1940. The summer heat is still here, but Main street has long since become a rather busy thoroughfare. The store that Brock and Sells founded 50 years ago, later to become the Delta Drug Store, is still in the same location and firmly entrenched in Hillsboro's business world. It lays claim to being the oldest local drug store in point of continuous operation by the present owners, Frank G. Mitchell and Fred Engeldinger, who look back with pride on their firm's half century of service.

Hillsboro, meanwhile, recognizes the store in its celebration of a golden anniversary and old customers are congratulating the proprietors on their combined 84 years as registered pharmacists. Mitchell, who went to work in the store in the year of its establishment, became a registered pharmacist in 1891. He holds Oregon certificate No. 383, which is relatively close to the start of licensed pharmacy in Oregon when consideration is taken of the thousands who have followed him.

Started in 1890

Engeldinger has been a registered pharmacist for 26 years. He first went to work in the store in 1910 when he was employed by the late J. P. Magruder, manager at that time. Except for 13 months of service in the army, he has been connected with the drug firm continually, since that time.

Mitchell and Engeldinger became partners in the store in November, 1921. At the present time, there are two other employees, Mrs. Alice Grey, who has been associated with them for about five years, and Glenn V. Payne, with a service record of 2½ years. Since the Mitchell-Engeldinger partnership, the store has been operated strictly on a prescription basis and strict compliance with the firm slogan, "Solely devoted to you—your doctor—and your good health."

In commemoration of the store's half century of establishment in Hillsboro, every customer in the store Saturday will be given a souvenir of the fiftieth anniversary year and a free orange, "golden" symbol of Delta's half-a-hundred-year mark.

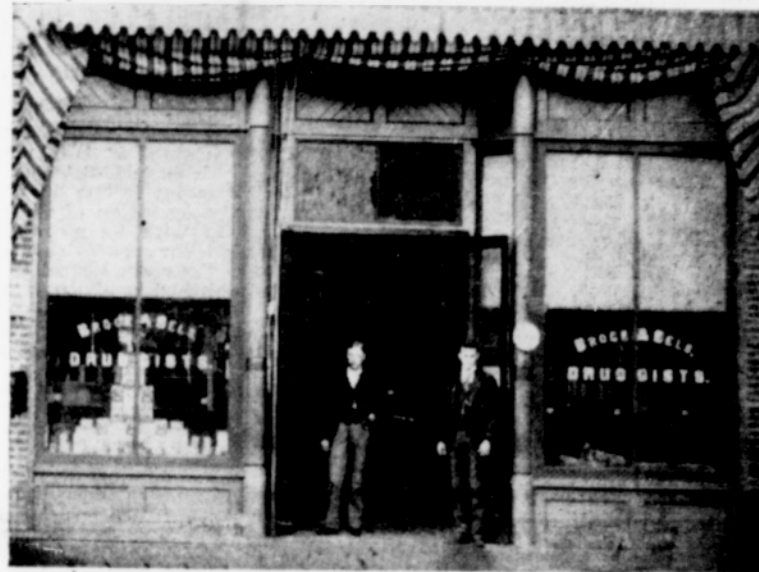
