Visited Callander
Turning west, the vacationists traveled through North Bay and Sault Ste. Marie. While in North Bay, they made a side trip to Callander, only eight miles away, birthplace of the Dionne quintuplets. Dr. Robb visited for some time there with Dr. Dufosse, who has written his name on medical records as the doctor who brought the quints into the world. The two men were classmates at the Toronto Medical school, graduating in the same class in 1907.

The quintuplets, who may be seen by the public through "one-way" glass at 11 a. m. and 4 p. m. daily when it is not raining, were riding tricycles in the yard when Dr. and Mrs. Robb saw them. The "one-way" glass, Dr. Robb explained, is so called because it is of such structure that it is possible for spectators to watch the children at play without the children being able to see through the glass from the other side. The sun was shining on the day of their visit, Dr. Robb recalled, and the quints were wearing white-rimmed dark glasses. They are beautiful children and as healthy as health itself, he said.

Saw Brothers
From Sault Ste. Marie, the Robbs drove through northern Michigan to Winnipeg and northwestern Manitoba. In Russell, Manitoba, they visited two of Dr. Robb's brothers, Bert and Roy. Coming farther west, they crossed the province of Saskatchewan and arrived in Lethbridge on Wednesday, July 3. Other points visited en route home were Calgary, Banff, Lake Louise and northwest cities.
