Fight on Demo Foreign Policy Stalls Action

A fight over foreign policy planks in the democratic platform Wednesday brought delay to the convention program at Chicago when Senator Claude Pepper of Florida, outspoken advocate of American aid to democracies, demanded that the resolution committee incorporate a clear-cut declaration that the United States will extend to Great Britain and nations resisting aggression full material aid short of American manpower.

The outcome of the resolutions committee struggle was uncertain, but one thing appeared inevitable from demonstration seen at the convention's opening session—that Franklin D. Roosevelt would be "drafted" for nomination as presidential candidate.

The war situation in Europe, meanwhile, continued to bristle with reports of marine losses and air attacks by both sides. Intense fighting was reported at various points on the Mediterranean, in Africa and over England. Japanese strategists took advantage of England's preoccupation at home to make demands which were met by the British crown.

Safety Hints--

UNEVEN TIRE WEAR

When front tires show uneven wear the cause usually is improper wheel alignment, although improper inflation is a factor, according to the Emergency Road Service of the Oregon State Motor association. Under-inflation causes excessive wear on the outer edge or shoulder of a tire; over-inflation, excessive wear in the center of the tread. Cupping wear at one edge indicates incorrect camber or other misalignment. Wavy wear over the entire tread surface indicates a loose front end assembly.

TIGHTENING BATTERY

Care should be used in tightening battery hold-down clamps, suggests the Emergency Road Service of the Oregon State Motor association. If too much force is used there is danger of causing the battery case to separate from the sealing compound, thus permitting the battery solution to leak out.

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Fill Ring Bologna With Salad

Potato salad fits into the picture. In fact, there's a special place for it—right in the center of a ring bologna in the middle of a platter.

The most attractive cold meat platter will have meat with variety in color, flavor and shape. A contrast of dark and light colors makes the arrangement interesting.

The assortment of cold meats offers decided variety in flavor. Some meats are smoked, others are not. The seasoning of cold meats is important and since it is done in a scientific basis, each meat contains the distinct spices and seasonings peculiar to it alone.

Many meats, particularly the dry sausages, have the favorite formula of the foreign lands which made them famous.

Vary Method of Cutting
Variety in shape is obvious as you see the rows of cold meats on a counter—square, round, oblong, rectangular.

Slices cut diagonally give a larger serving and a different shape.

Cold Meats Ideal For Hot Season

As assorted as a Smorgasbord, and in many ways just as interesting, is a platter of cold cuts of meat attractively arranged to entice hot-weather appetites.

Inez S. Willson, home economist, calls to your attention that with cold cuts, variety is practically infinite. There's salami of many kinds, veal loaf, minced ham, liver sausage, corned beef, spiced tongue, and many other specialties. Left-over roast thinly sliced and very cold can also find its place on a colorful platter arranged for buffet entertainment, the family supper or guests "just drop in."

If you had 10 or 50 sacks of potatoes to sell, how much would you offer a salesman to sell them for you? If you'll ask Howard Rhodes of Cedar Mills, he'll gladly tell you how he hired a "salesman" to turn the trick for a poultry 36 cents.

Picking Linens Requires Study Of Many Fabrics

Oregon's interest in the production of fiber flax for linen has increased the interest of consumers in linen materials. It isn't always easy to judge the quality of linen on the counter, as there are many grades to be considered, says Miss Lucy Lane, extension specialist in textiles and clothing at Oregon State college.

Length of fiber directly affects the quality of linen fabrics. The long fibers, called "line," are used for table and dress linens. The short, broken ones, or "tow," are used for coarser fabrics like toweling, crashes, and novelty luncheon cloths. So the label "all pure linen" does not tell the whole story. It is necessary to know whether the linen is line or tow.

Grass Linen
Some of the coarse, irregularly woven linen materials are made from grass linen, or "ramie," which

is a related fiber with many of the same properties as linen. You may see table doilies and runners and embroidered scarfs of ramie.

The natural color of linen is gray. Linen is sold in different degrees of bleach. The more the cloth is bleached the more it is weakened. Half-bleached or three-quarter-bleached linen will gradually whiten during use and is stronger than fully bleached linen.

Loose Weaves Sized
Most of the coarser or loosely woven linens are sized to give them the stiffness that is characteristic of the better linens. After the sizing or glaze is washed out, the cloth be-

comes sleazy, porous, and limp. In buying linen dish towels and similar articles, hold them up to the light to see whether the individual fabric appears to be glazed over, Miss Lane suggests.

Linen wrinkles easily and requires more pressing than cloth made of other fibers. However, wrinkle and crease-resistant finishes are overcoming this characteristic to some extent.
