

Interest Cuts Mean Saving On Farm Loans

Approximately \$82,000 will be saved by farmers of Columbia and Washington counties during the next two years as the result of reduced interest rates on most types of federal land bank and land bank commissioner loans, Arthur M. S. Stook, Hillsboro, secretary-treasurer of National Farm Loan association serving the counties, announced this week.

Legislation adopted recently by Congress and approved by President Roosevelt fixes the interest rate on the next two years' installment loans on both loans with some few exceptions, at 3 1/2 per cent annually. Land bank loans made since 1917 have been written at varying rates of interest, but average about 5 per cent. Land Bank Commissioner loans made since 1933 have been written at a 5 per cent rate.

Rate Continued
The 3 1/2 per cent rate on land bank loans, it was explained, is a continuation of a rate that has been in effect since 1933. The new rate on commissioner loans brings another one-half of 1 per cent from the interest charge, a special rate of 4 per cent having been in effect on these loans for some time.

The Hillsboro National Farm Loan association office services approximately \$2,735,000 in land bank and land bank commissioner loans. The annual saving in Montana, Idaho, Washington and Oregon—the territory served by the Federal Land bank of Spokane—will be in excess of \$2,000,000, Stook estimated.

Warehouses Rushed With Big Seed Crop
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gram and are being shipped to the southeastern states, where they are being used for cover crop in cotton fields. The AAA reportedly is parceling the field peas out to cotton farmers under a "grant of aid" plan. It is believed that approximately 75 per cent of this country's 1940 crop will be purchased by the government.

Yield Heavier
Reports from local seed warehouses indicate that not only is there double the acreage in peas this year but that the yield per acre is heavier, estimates for the current harvest being between 900 and 1000 pounds of clean seed per acre as compared with 700 to 750 pounds in the 1939 season. Howard Hadley, Imperial Feed manager, said Friday that his plant is this year handling seed harvested from 4000 to 5000 acres as compared with 3000 acres last year and R. N. Baker, Farmers' Union warehouse manager, estimated that plant's gain is from about 1400 acres last year to about 5000 acres for the current crop season.

Prices Vary
The AAA seed-purchasing program also includes hairy vetch, but private dealers are paying 25 cents per 100 pounds, whereas the government's set price of \$7.25 and are consequently absorbing all this seed. Common and Hungarian vetch seed are not being purchased under the government set-up.

All seed for the AAA is being carried in cotton bags instead of the burlap commonly used. This government requirement, it is said, has been established as an attempt to use up the south's cotton surplus.

Government regulation for handling AAA seed also provides that each farmer's seed is to be stamped with a recording number. This number, stamped on the burlap sacks of uncleaned seed as it comes in from the field, is followed through on the cotton bags, stamped on all records, bills of lading and other papers pertaining to a particular allotment of seed until it is delivered to the southern cotton farmer, who can trace the source of any seed if he wishes.

Requirements Set
All seed is tested for germination and purity. Minimum germination requirement for live Austrian pea seed, including hard seed, is 90 per cent. Purity minimum is 99 per cent. For pea seed of 88 per cent minimum germination and purity 98 per cent, a price of .029 has been set and for seed of 86 per cent minimum germination with purity 98 per cent, the price is set at .023 cents per pound.

Other requirements and prices follow:
Hairy vetch—Minimum germination 90 per cent, hairy vetch 95 per cent, total all vetch 98 per cent, price .0725; minimum germination 90 per cent, hairy vetch 90 per cent, total all vetch 98 per cent, price .066.
Mixed Peas and Vetch—Minimum germination 90 per cent, purity peas 93 per cent, purity vetch 3 per cent, price .0295; minimum germination 90 per cent, purity peas 88 per cent, purity vetch 10 per cent, price .0275; minimum germination 90 per cent, purity peas 83 per cent, purity vetch 1 per cent, price .0265 cents per pound.
All seeds being for AAA purchase are being fumigated with methyl bromide before storage in warehouses awaiting shipment orders.

Youth Employment Plan Launched By Walter Mack

A new milestone in American business was seen early this month with the introduction of a novel system of business internship for young American men and women—the first specific step of its kind in industry.

Known as the "Walter Mack Job Awards for American Youth," it is a pioneering measure to develop jobs for young college people seeking to enter the business world, being in essence the granting of a group of business fellowships in the form of actual salaries jobs.

Notables Present
The plan was launched at a luncheon at LaGuardia field, New York, on July 8, with Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt and Hon. Fiorello H. LaGuardia, president of the U. S. conference of mayors, among the speakers. A cross-section of some of the most noted people in America in the fields of business, the arts, music, literature, theatre, sports and public life were also present. The plan has the active sponsorship and participation of hundreds of colleges in states throughout the Union, including the University of Portland.

Emphasizing that the plan calls for the creation of new, higher, non-existent jobs, to be developed insofar as is reasonably possible in those very departments of a company in which the applicant wishes training for his future life-long business career, Walter S. Mack, Jr., president of the Pepsi-Cola company, who is initiating the plan in his organization, said that he knew of no happier way of celebrating a thirty-five-year commemoration of the bottling of his company's product, the occasion which inspired the job awards plan, than by creating new opportunities for the youth of today.
